National Collegiate Championships

Oklahoma A&M's smashing team triumph and record entries for both individual and teams marked the 25th National Collegiate Wrestling Championships held in Cornell University's Barton Hall at Ithaca, N. Y., March 25-26.

In what was regarded as one of the most successful wrestling tournaments ever staged, Coach Art Griffith's Aggies scored 40 points to top the field of 66 schools represented by 181 competitors. Since the first National Collegiate Championships in 1928, the Aggies have won 17 titles and shared another.

Penn State was runnerup with 31 points, followed by Eastern champion Pittsburgh with 28, Oklahoma 26, Lehigh 25, Iowa 24, Michigan 23, Navy 21 and Illinois 19, among the chief contenders.

For the Aggies, the triumph was particularly rewarding because it was achieved without the help of Ned Blass, two-time 177-pound champion whose shoulder injury kept him out of the tournament. The winners produced two champions in Myron Roderick at 130 (137 victor in 1954) and Fred Davis at 167. Dave Bowlin was runnerup at 115 and Doug Blubaugh placed third at 147.

Edward Eichelberger, Lehigh 147-pounder, was awarded the Coaches' Trophy as the tournament's outstanding performer. He stopped Lloyd Corwin of Cornell of Iowa in 6:43 for his fourth pin in five bouts; George Mulligan of Rutgers was decisioned, 10-5, in the semi-finals.

While two 1954 champions came through again (Pete Blair of Navy at 191 in addition to Roderick), two others failed to repeat. Iowa's Dick Govig was eliminated in the 123 quarter-finals by Sam Cario of Cortland State on a referee's decision. Joe Solomon of Pittsburgh lost his semi-final 167-pound bout to Larry TenPas of Illinois, 8-1. TenPas was defeated by Davis, 9-2.

When sophomore Ed Peery of Pittsburgh pinned Lewis Guidi of West Virginia in 8:30 to win the 123-pound title, a milestone in family tradition was reached. Last year Peery's brother, Hugh, triumphed at 115 for the third straight time. The boys' father Rex, coach at Pittsburgh, wrestled for Oklahoma A&M and won the 118 crown in 1933-34-35. For the crowd of 3,500, as well as for the Peery family, all in attendance, the emotional aspects of Ed's triumph were tremendous.

Other champions crowned were Terry McCann of Iowa at 115, Lawrence Fornicola of Penn State at 137, Bill Weick of Iowa State Teachers at 157, Dan Hodge of Oklahoma at 177 and Bill Oberly of Penn State, heavyweight.

McCann disposed of Bowlin in 7:06. Fornicola decisioned Andy Kaul of Michigan, 6-0. Weick got a takedown in the last 20 seconds to win a rousing battle with Mike Rodriguez of Michigan, 6-4. Weick won the 157 title in 1952, prior to Army service. Hodge pinned Penn State's Joe Krufka in 4:23. Oberly decisioned Werner Seel of Lehigh, 5-3.

The smooth dispatch of the 214 bouts, 101 in the Friday afternoon preliminaries, was due in part to the use of five mats simultaneously in all but the third-place finals and championships.

The new National Collegiate scoring system was in effect. For first place, 7 points were awarded; second, 5; third, 3, and fourth 1. Falls, defaults and forfeits accounted for an additional point as did advancement beyond an initial round containing one or more byes.

The Tournament Director was Patrick J. Filley, freshman football coach and athletic administrative assistant at Cornell. New officers of the National Collegiate Wrestling Coaches Association are Arnold (Swede) Umbach of Auburn, President, succeeding Clifford Keen of Michigan; Charles Speidel of Penn State, Vice-President, and Dr. Frank Finger of Virginia, Secretary-Treasurer.

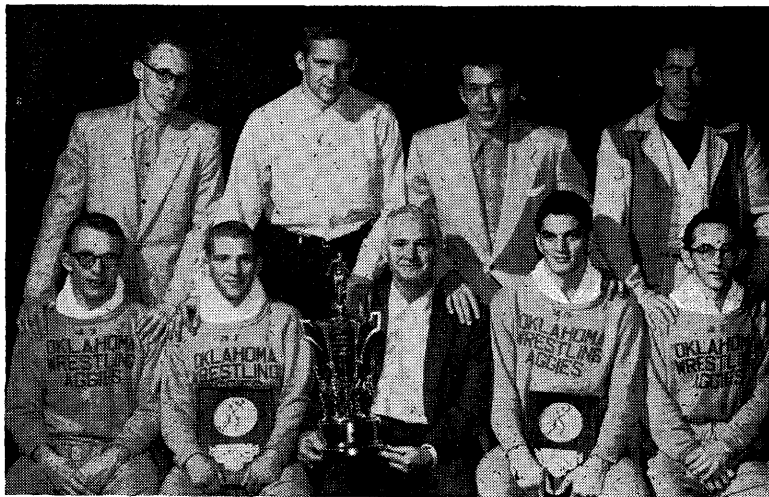

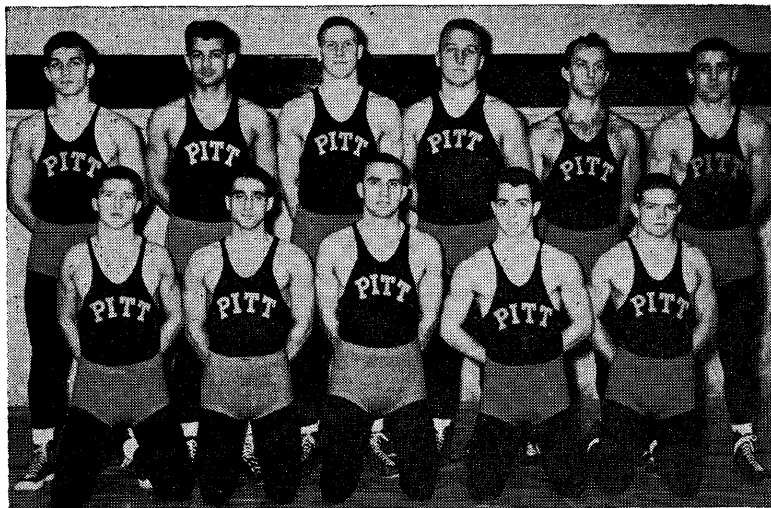

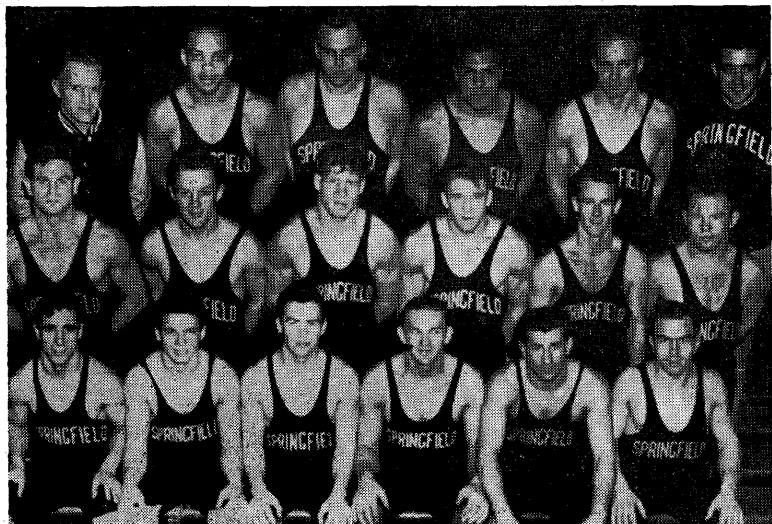

COLLEGIATE REVIEWS

Eastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Association

The University of Pittsburgh successfully defended its team title in the fifty-first annual championship tournament of the Eastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Association at Pennsylvania State University.

The Panther squad, competing in the EIWA event for only the second year, garnered three gold medals, one second place silver medal and a fourth place award to total 51 points. Penn State was a close second with 50 points. The Lions captured only one individual championship but took two seconds, two thirds, and a fourth. Lehigh finished in third position with 38 points and Navy with 37 points was fourth.

Edwin Rooney of Syracuse took the 157-pound individual championship for the second year running while Navy's Joseph Gattuso successfully defended his 167-pound crown and Pete Blair of the Navy won the heavyweight title for the second straight year.

Blair was the recipient of the John A. Fletcher Memorial Trophy awarded for the first time in 1955 to "the wrestler whose efforts have contributed the most to the success of his team in EIWA tournament competition." The Annapolis champion scored a career total of 32 points—13 in 1955, 9 in 1954, 7 in 1953 and 3 in 1952. Lehigh's Edward Eichelberger, the new 147 champion, was the tournament's high scorer with 15 points and the winner of the Outstanding Wrestler Trophy. The Lehigh ace pinned all four opponents.

Blair and Eichelberger along with Ed Peery of Pitt, Lawrence Fornicola of Penn State and teammate Bill Oberly, later earned individual national collegiate championships.

Cornell University's coach Jimmy Miller, was elected president of the EIWA Coaches Association to succeed Dick Voliva of Rutgers. The Coaches Association presented an inscribed gold watch to Fred S. Nonnemacher, sports editor of the Bethlehem Globe-Times in recognition of his lifetime devotion to wrestling.

The 1956 EIWA tournament will be held at Lehigh University.

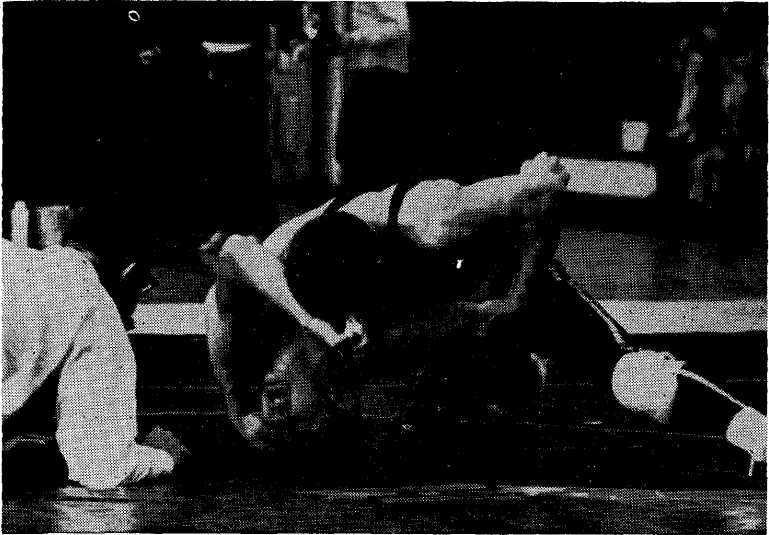

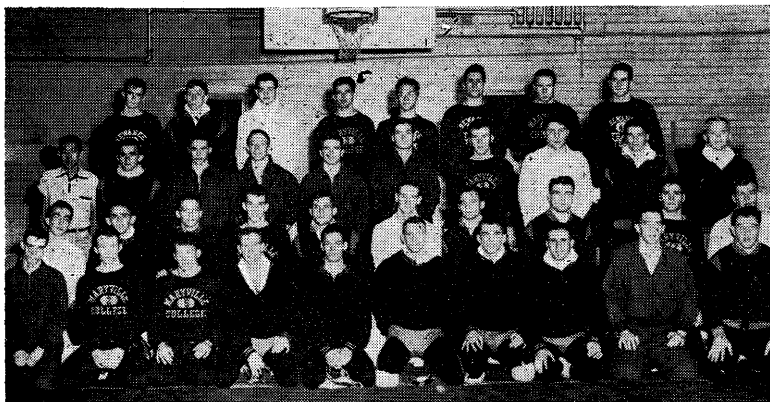
leges, universities and other organizations. This hot bed of wrestling was certainly alive for this outstanding tournament.

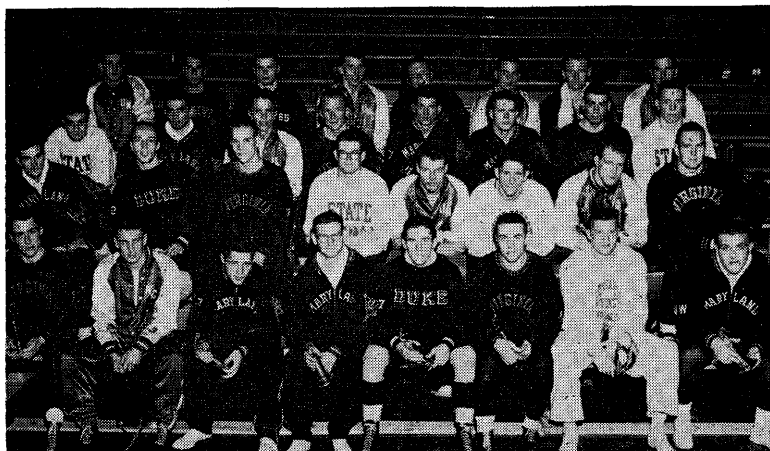
The outstanding wrestler award went to Lewis Guidi of West Virginia University.

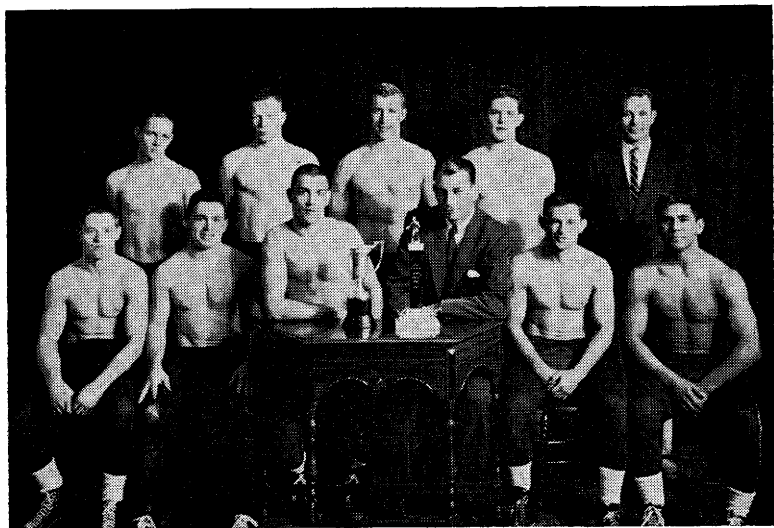

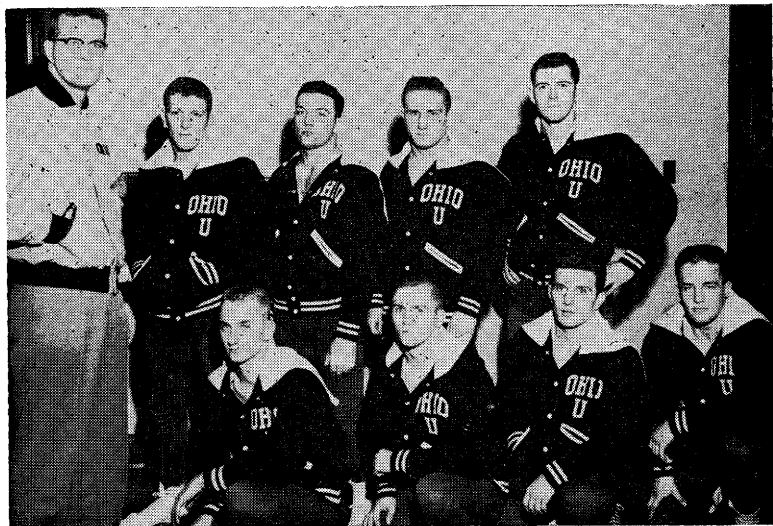

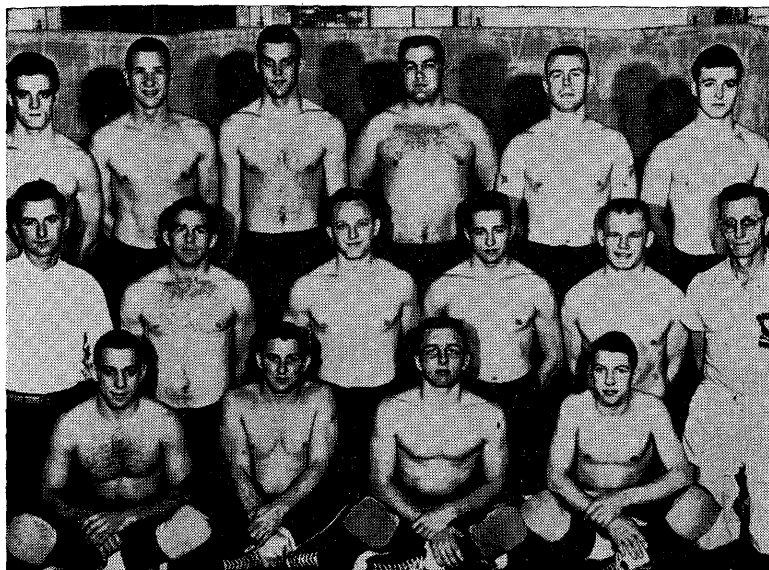

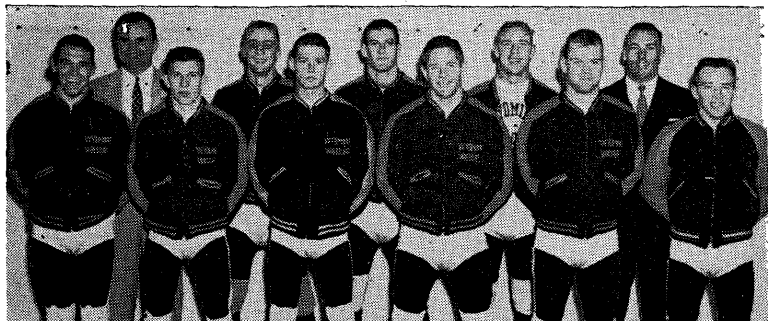

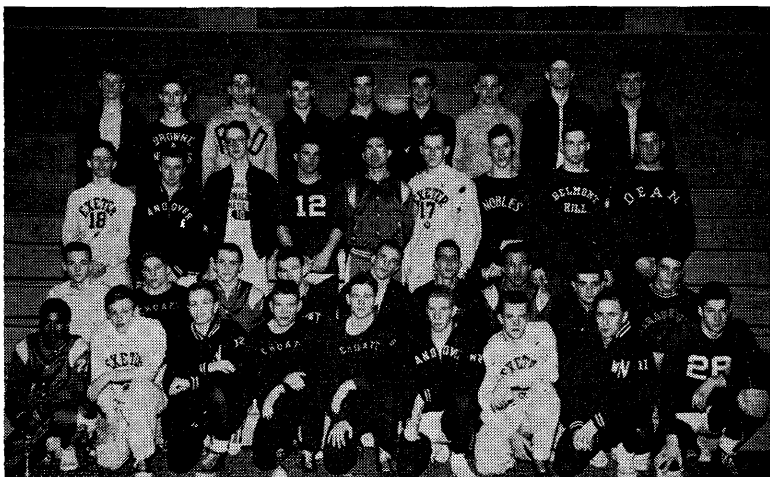
