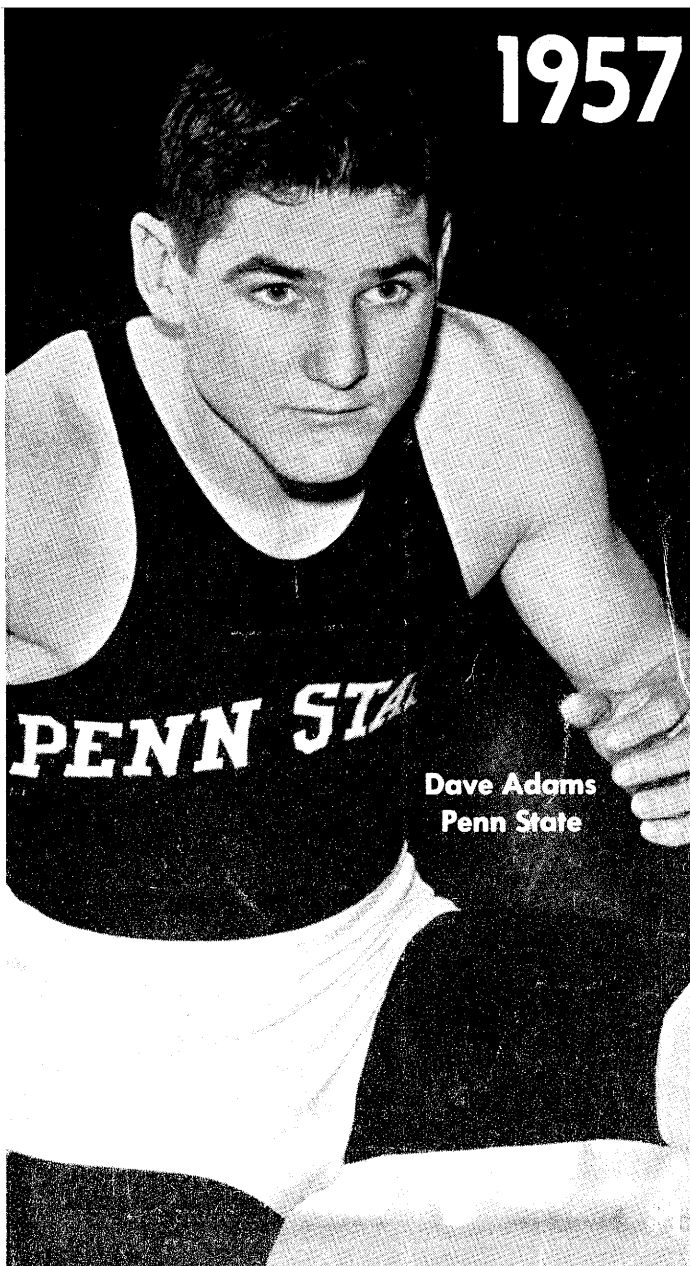

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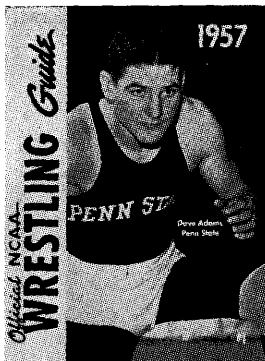

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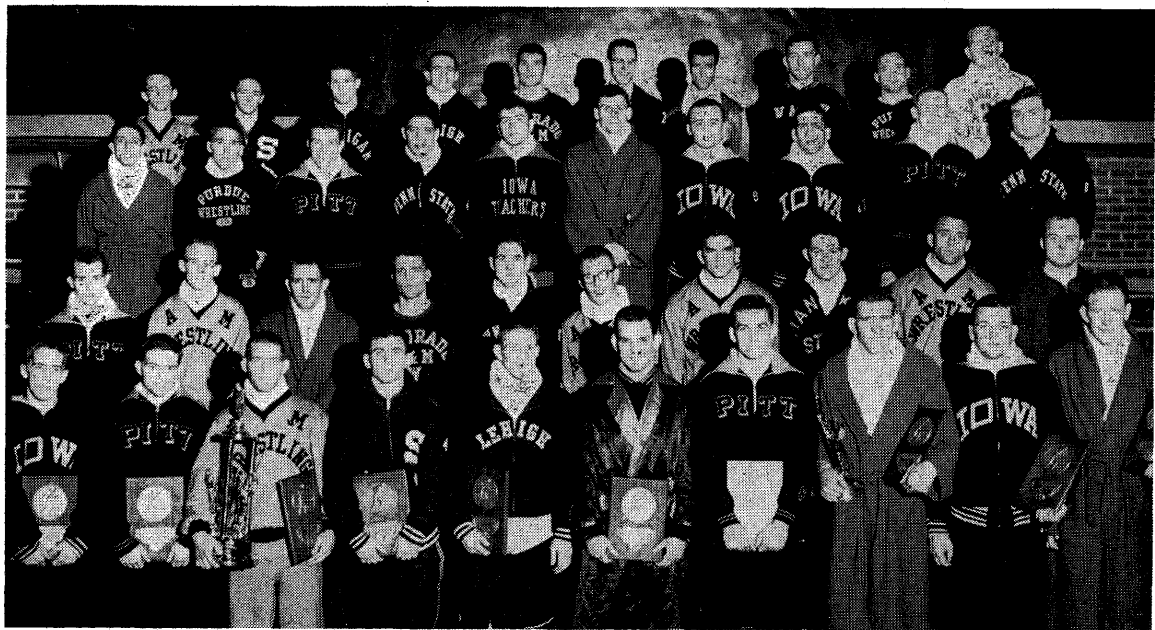

National Collegiate Championships

Collegiate wrestling's 26th annual National Collegiate Wrestling Championships held at Oklahoma A&M College's Gallagher Hall were one of the greatest in the history of the meet as the host Aggies narrowly retained the national title for the third consecutive year.

Certainly from the standpoint of exceptional performance and rugged competition in every weight bracket the meet must be ranked among the best. There were seven defending champions and seven runner-ups from the previous year's meet at Cornell University, plus an unusual number of proven stars.

Five returning 1955 champions successfully defended their titles but most were seriously pressed by the excellent field of contenders. Fred Davis, defending Oklahoma A&M champion at 167 pounds, was beaten by Ed DeWitt of Pittsburgh and William Oberly, defending heavyweight champion from Penn State, was dethroned by the eager sophomore from Oklahoma, Gordon Roesler.

Myron Roderick, Oklahoma A&M's 130-pound champion, became the 16th man in the history of the tournament to become a three-time champion when he retained his crown at 130. Terrance McCann of Iowa, was perhaps least pressed of the smaller men as he swept to the 115-pound crown again.

Ed Peery, Pittsburgh, encountered tough opposition in quarter-final, semi-final and final bouts but outlasted the field to take his second championship at 123 pounds. Three early falls and two wide decisions marked Edward Eichelberger's march to the championship again at 147 pounds, the Lehigh star winning his final bout, 6-2.

Fifth of the successful defending champions was Oklahoma's Dan Hodge who swept through the 177-pound bracket with four quick falls to win acclaim as the tournament's outstanding individual performer. No rival stayed more than 4:35 with the Sooner strong boy.

Michigan State's Jim Sinadinos, 137; Larry TenPas, the 157-pound star of Illinois, and Iowa's Kenneth Leuer at 191 pounds, were the three new champions along with DeWitt and Roesler. Sinadinos found Colorado A&M's Ron Day most difficult in a 4-3 final; TenPas similarly had his most grueling test in the finals where he beat Douglas Blubaugh, of Oklahoma A&M, 4-3; Leuer encountered no major trouble until his win over Jim Gregson, Oklahoma A&M, in a 5-3 final. Gregson was 1949 champion at 175 pounds.

Coach Art Griffith's Oklahoma Aggies very nearly duplicated their 1954 feat at Norman when they clinched the team championship on Saturday afternoon ahead of the final round. This time, however, the Aggies were not quite secure at the close of the semi-finals although they advanced five men to the championship round.

The Saturday afternoon situation found the Aggies in position to sew up the team championship if they could win one of the five championship matches, and if Oklahoma lost one of three championship tests in which the Sooners had a contender. As it developed, the Aggies' Roderick put it away when he defeated Oklahoma's Bobby Lyons, 9-4, for the championship in the third match of the championship finals. All other Aggies lost in the finals to leave the final score: Oklahoma A&M 65, Oklahoma 62, with Pittsburgh in third place at 51.

It marked the 19th championship scored by Oklahoma A&M in the 26-year history of the tournament, including A&M's co-championship with Iowa State in 1933, and Roderick's triumph was the 64th individual championship won by an Oklahoma Aggie. He became the 10th Aggie to win three titles.

When the 1957 meet opens at Pittsburgh, only three defending champions will be available since seven of this year's individual kings are seniors. Peery and Hodge, both hopeful of acquiring the honor of three-time champions, and Roesler, who is a junior this year.

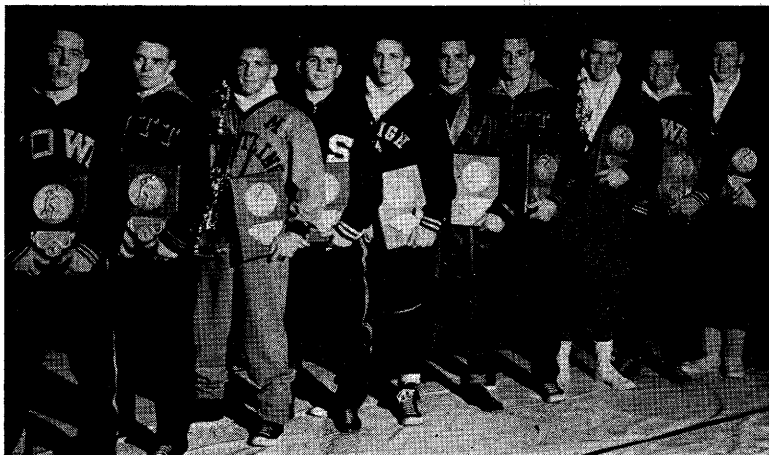

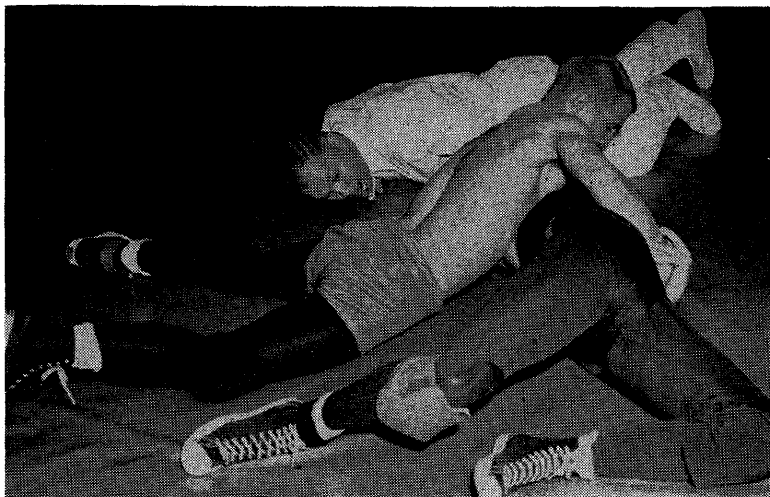

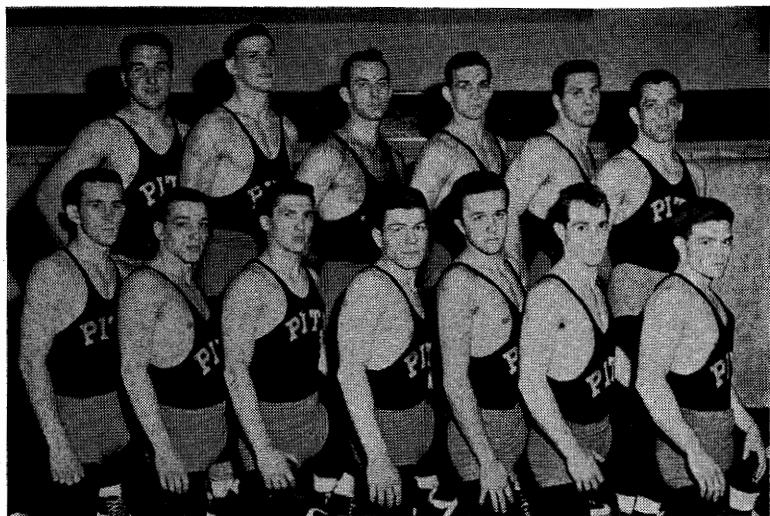

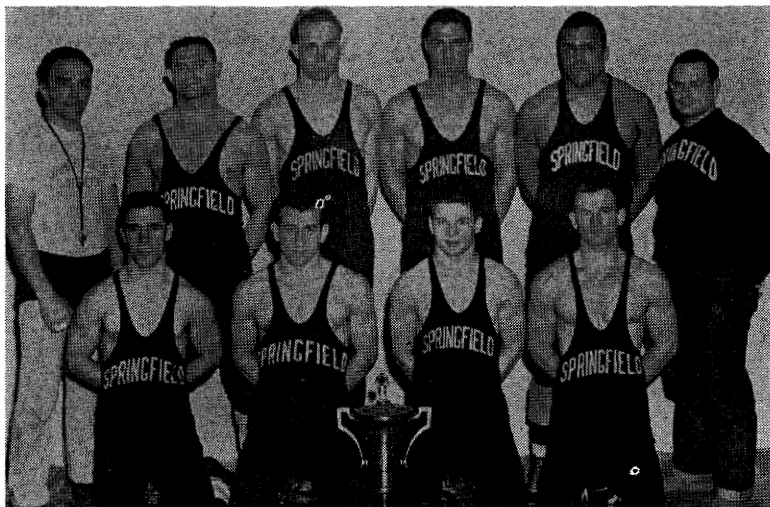

COLLEGIATE REVIEWS

Eastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Association

For the third consecutive year the University of Pittsburgh's stellar wrestling aggregation captured premier laurels in the Eastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Association's annual tournament. Also, for the third straight year, the Panthers beat out Penn State for the EIWA championship.

Oddly enough in the past two tourneys the margin in the title triumph was by a single point; 74-73 this past March 9-10 at Lehigh University, and 51-50 in 1955. Pittsburgh was a newcomer to the EIWA membership roll in 1954 when the Panthers captured their inaugural team award, downing the Nittany Lions by a 37-25 tally.

Coach Rex Peery's charges won three individual titles, took one runner-up award and three third-place medals. Penn State garnered a trio of gold medals, a pair of second place awards and a fourth spot bronze award.

Lehigh's Ed Eichelberger won the tournament's most valuable wrestler trophy for the second straight year. He was the second man to take this award twice, the other being Midshipman John A. Fletcher of Navy. In addition, Eichelberger was voted the John A. Fletcher Memorial Trophy for contributing the most to the success of his team in EIWA tournament competition.

In a bout of two undefeated rivals, Joe Gratto of Lehigh beat John Pepe of Penn State in the 137-pound division. Prior to this match, sophomore Gratto had rung up a string of 14 victories and Pepe had taken 11 in a row.

Other individual champions were Sidney Nodland, Penn State, 123-pounds; John Johnston, Penn State, 130; Dave Johnson, Pittsburgh, 157; Don Huff, Pittsburgh, 167; Ed DeWitt, Pittsburgh, 177 and Bill Oberly, Penn State, heavyweight.

The 1957 EIWA tournament is scheduled for Penn State's campus and the 1958 event has been awarded to Pittsburgh.

Springfield College won the New England Intercollegiate Wrestling Association tournament for the sixth consecutive year, taking half of the individual crowns and scoring 72 points to 49 for runner-up Wesleyan.

Coast Guard Academy scored 36 to take third place and close behind came Amherst College with 33. Tufts scored 24, Williams 22, MIT 16, Boston University 10 and Massachusetts—30.

Though they could only win one individual championship, the strong team effort of the Panthers won over Michigan, last year's winner.

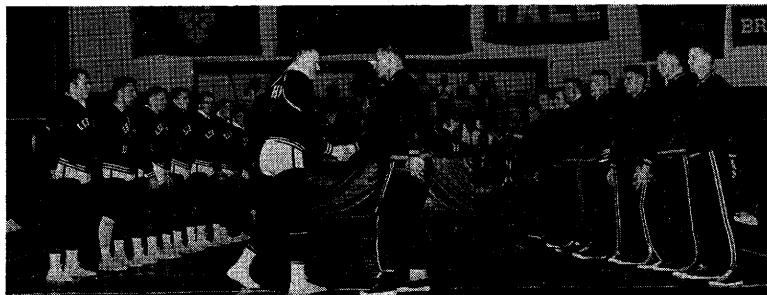

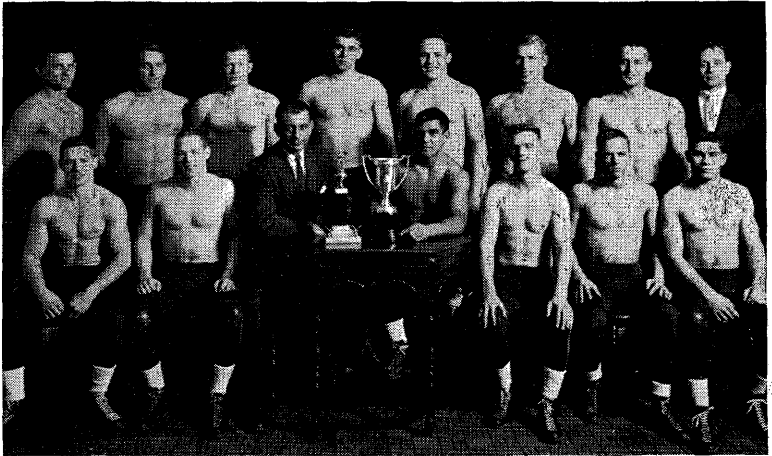

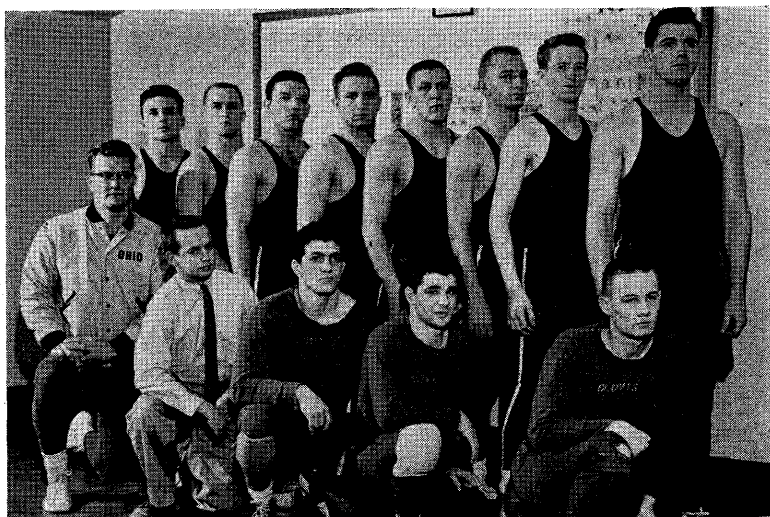

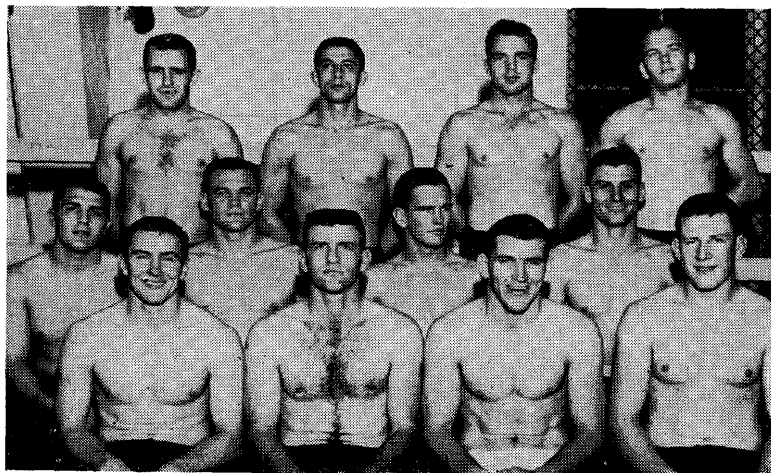

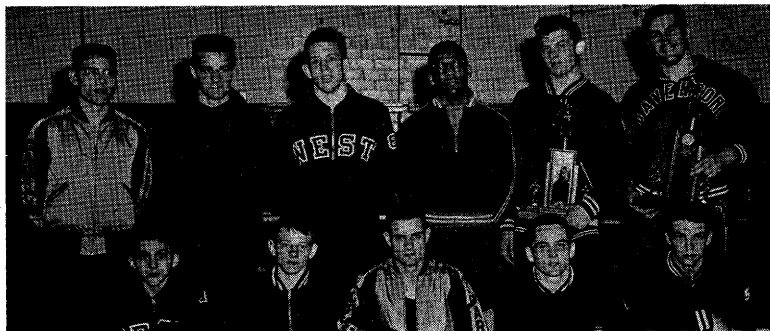

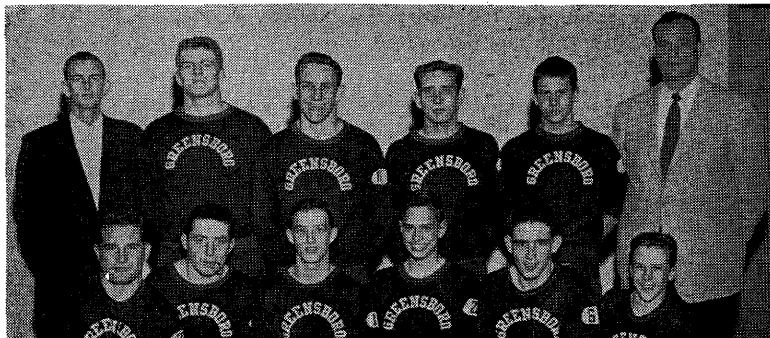
