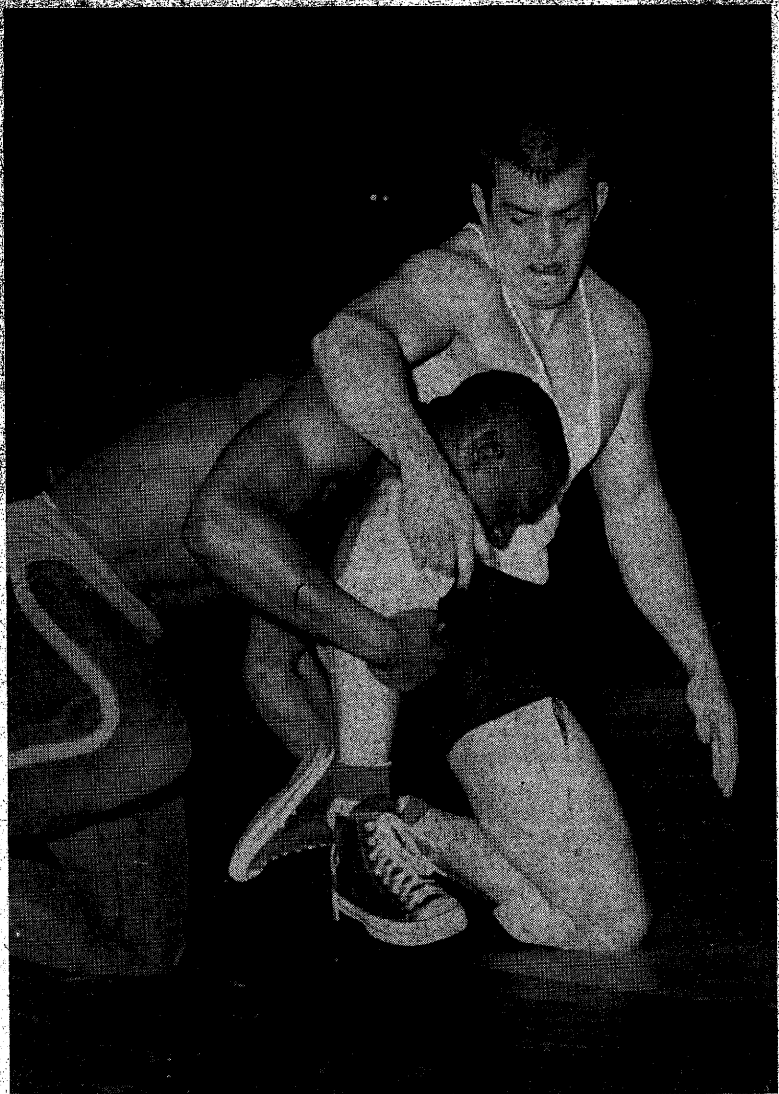

# National Collegiate Championships

Everything was massive at the 29th annual National Collegiate wrestling championship tournament: Oklahoma State's record margin of victory, 22 points; the number of matches, 303 in five sessions; the total entrants, 274; and the total length of sessions, 20 hours and 15 minutes.

Never before in tournament history—which dates back to 1928 at the first meet at Iowa State College in Ames—had so many institutions entered so many athletes.

Sixty-seven schools actually had men in competition and 47 of them scored. The rampant Cowboys from Stillwater amply defended their team title with 73 points, winning their fifth crown in six years, far ahead of runner-up Iowa State (51) and state rival, Oklahoma (41). Iowa edged into fourth place, equalling its all-time best, 33 points, and fifth place went to Pittsburgh.

Oklahoma State led from the first, although after the semi-finals the margin over Iowa State was only 9 points. The first three teams finished in the same order as in 1958.

Although the top dogs of the Big Eight Conference continued their domination, Eastern schools cracked through for four titles, the most since their five in 1955. They were Yale, winning its first individual title; Cornell University, Lehigh and Syracuse.

Only two of the five 1958 champions who competed emerged with another title. One titlist, Paul Powell of Pittsburgh, was unable to defend because of injury. The successful ones were Ron Gray, Iowa State (147) and Dick Beattie, Oklahoma State (157).

The dethroned ones were Les Anderson, Iowa State, beaten in the 130 final by Stan Abel of Oklahoma; Paul Aubrey of Oklahoma, whipped in the semi-final by sophomore Larry Hayes of Iowa State and Duane Murty of Oklahoma State, ousted from the unbeaten class by Ed Hamer of Lehigh, the eventual champion, in the semi-final. Tom Alberts of Pittsburgh, 1957 champion who did not compete last season, was beaten in the 167 final.

The champion Cowboys had two champions, one runner-up, three third-place men and one in fourth place. Iowa State also had two champions, but only one runner-up and one third-place to help its point total. Oklahoma had a titlist, a runner-up and a third-place man and fourth place Iowa had a champion and two thirds.

The tournament as usual produced some great performances and the normal number of surprises. Ron Gray of Iowa State was voted the outstanding wrestler after winning his second straight 147 title and 255-pound Ted Ellis of Oklahoma State was awarded the trophy for the fastest fall, 2:20, over Don Darter of Kansas State. Ellis scored four falls and a 2-0 overtime decision in winning unlimited class honors.

Larry Hayes, the Iowa State youngster, unawed by records and reputations of opponents, upset unbeaten Shelby Wilson of Oklahoma State, the 1958 runner-up, in the 137 final. Wilson entered the match with four tournament victories by a total score of 51-14 but Hayes whipped him easily, 10-3. Previously, he had dumped Paul Aubrey, the defending champion, in the semi-final.

Iowa's Jim Craig gave the Hawkeyes their second straight 177-pound title and football player Arthur Baker of Syracuse became the second Negro to win a title when he outlasted Big Ten champion and unbeaten Tim Woodin at 191.

Some 16,500 persons attended the five sessions as the University of Iowa was host to the meet for the first time. Five mats were used for the largest sessions. The meet was extended to three days for the first time but the first session, prelims and first round, had 135 matches and lasted for 6 hours and 15 minutes, until 1:45 a.m.

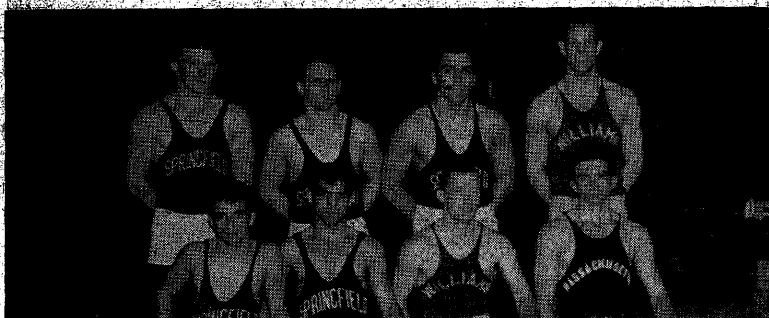

# COLLEGIATE REVIEWS

## Eastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Association

Lehigh University scored 64 points to annex its first EIWA championship since 1947. The meet, held at Cornell University, Ithaca, N. Y., saw the Bethlehem contingent have individual champions crowned at 137 and 147 pounds in addition to Richard Santoro earning the John A. Fletcher trophy "as the competitor whose efforts have contributed the most to the success of his team..."

The Engineers also had one silver medalist in Braden Turner (167) and a pair of third place finishers, Leon Harbold (130) and Gregory Ruth (157).

Santoro, the Lehigh captain and 1958 titleholder of the 147-pound crown, defeated Tom Grifa of Rutgers to win the 137-pound honors. John Driscoll, victor over Sam Minor of Penn State in the 147-pound final and Ed Hamer, a 9-4 winner over Harvard's Bob Foster in the 177-pound class, were the other Lehigh champions.

Over 5,000 spectators sat in on the finals and also saw Cornell's Dave Auble become the only other defending titlist to repeat. The Big Red star defeated Andy Fitch of Yale, 8-3, in the 123-pound divider and Auble, in earning 14 points, was named the outstanding wrestler of the tourney by the coaches.

Pitt's Larry Lauchle took the 130-pound title with an 8-3 win over Dan Johnston of Penn State. Cornell's Steve Friedman, twice a runner-up in EIWA events, provided the most exciting match of the day with a take-down just 15 seconds from the end of the battle to triumph over Bill Macaleer of Princeton.

Tom Alberts of Pitt was a 4-2 victor over Lehigh's Turner in the 167-pound class and Syracuse's Art Baker was a winner in the heavyweight section with a 4-2 decision over Johnston Oberly of Penn State.

The 1960 championships, scheduled for Princeton, N. J., will see the addition of a 191-pound class for the first time in the 56-year history of the event.

Lehigh now leads in team victories with 13 wins and one tie. Penn State (13) is second and Cornell (12) is third. Penn State is tops in individual titles with 74. Cornell has 72 and Lehigh 71.

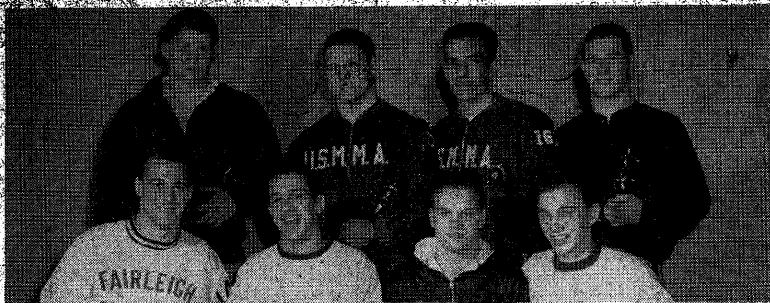

## New England I.W.A.

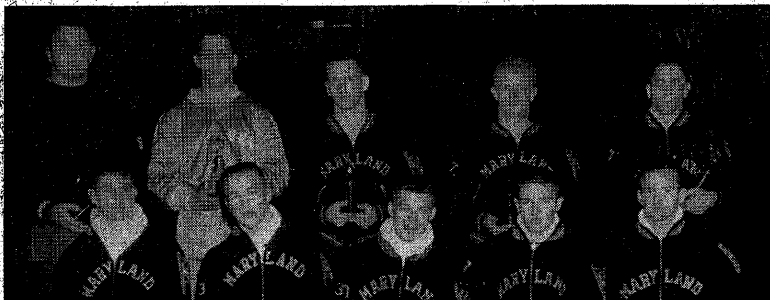

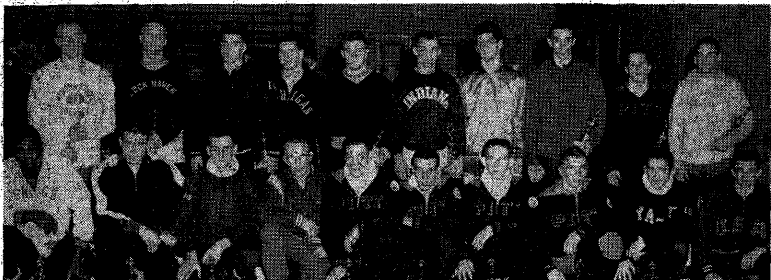

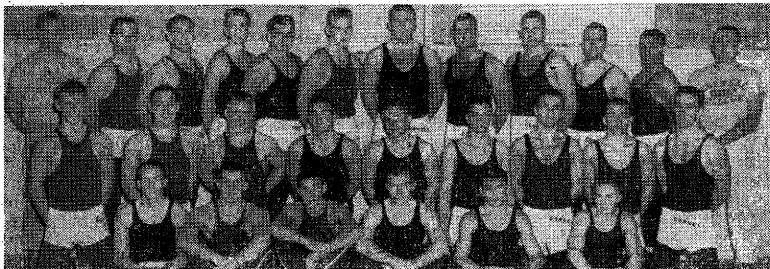

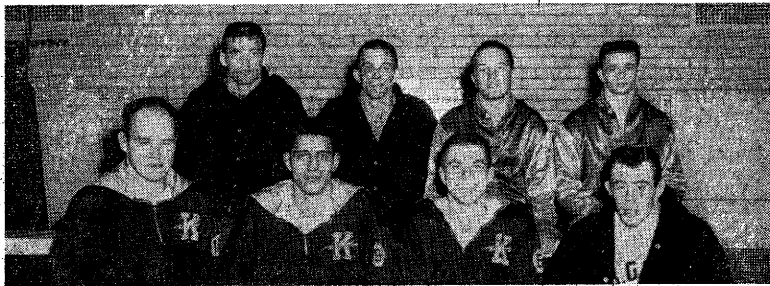

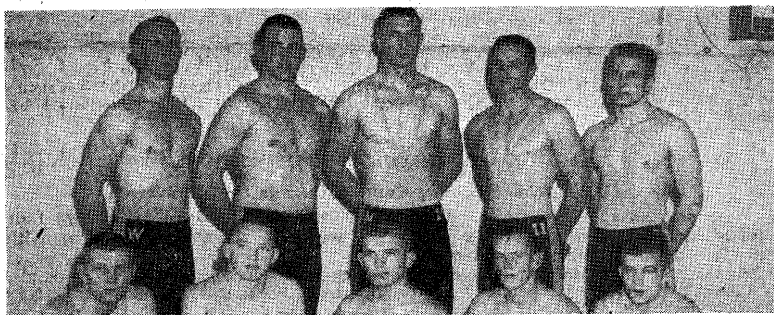

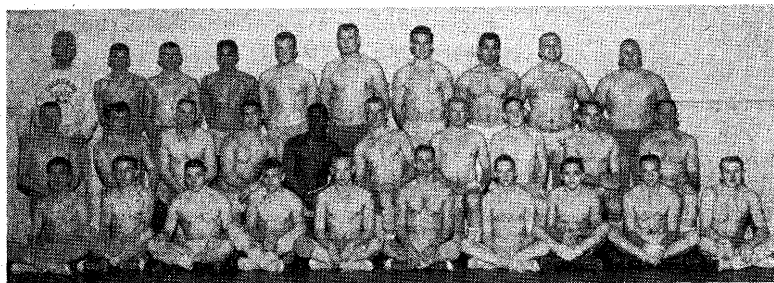

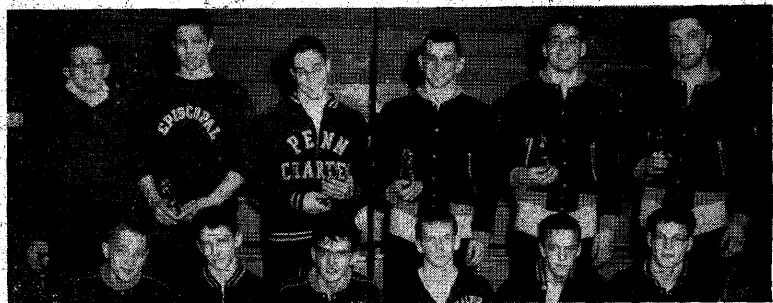

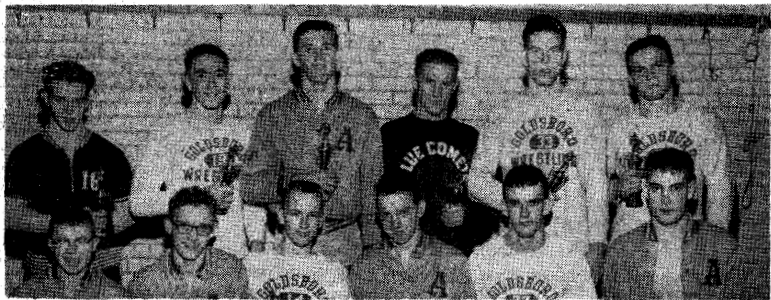

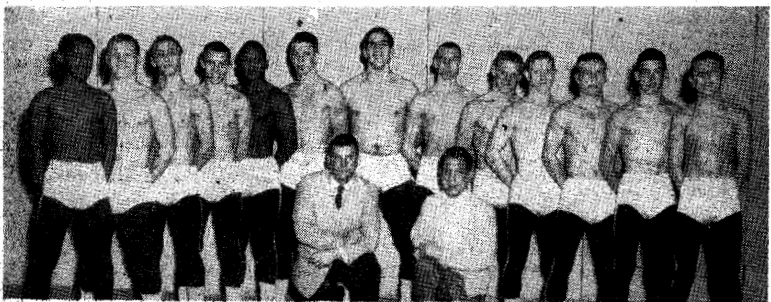

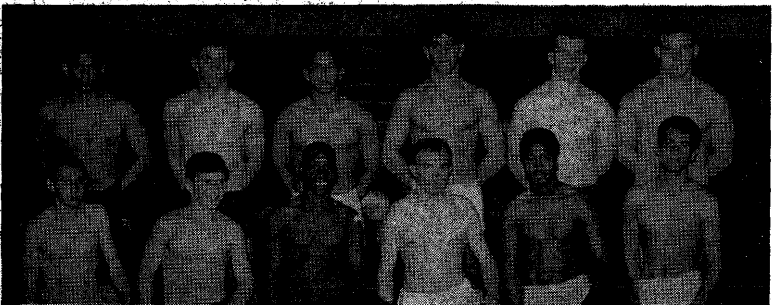
