Pride?

You'd better believe it.

Pick your sport, football, wrestling, tiddlywinks or marbles, and ten years ago the North Dakota State University Bison were pretty much the Conference Comedy Relief. In 1962, for example, the Bison were 0-10 in football. Basketball, the only moderately strong Bison sport, fared a shade better that year with an 8-17 split, but the wrestling program was strictly from nowheresville.

Then came Darrell Mudra, Ron Erhardt, Bud Belk and Bucky Maughan and it isn't like that at NDSU anymore.

Football was the first to profit from the new change in outlook. Over that exciting decade, the Bison, mainly under Erhardt's generalship, parlayed the new philosophy into three top-place finishes in the national ratings, six post-season bowl bids (five of which they won), 27 Little All Americas, seven straight North Central Conference championships, 22 games without a loss . . . and an assortment of other marks of distinction.

Basketball, which seemed to be in a continual state of character building at NDSU, came into its own two weeks ago yesterday (Feb. 25), when the Bison brought the North Central Conference crown home from Grand Forks. The game was admittedly a squeaker (76-75 in an overtime) but a championship, nonetheless, the first one the Bison had garnered, uncontested, since 1952.

For Bucky Maughan, the wrestling program has been even more of a bootstrap operation. He had joined the staff in 1964, fresh from a stellar career as a high school and college wrestler—Pennsylvania State High School Champion in 1959; an undefeated dual record at Moorhead State; the NCAA University Division Championship at 115 pounds in 1963; NAIA Championships at 123 in both '62 and '63. The team he took over that year had chalked up a mortifying 1-12 record the previous season, including a forfeit. That first year with Maughan at the helm, the Bison compiled the best record in the school's wrestling history (a fairly unspectacular 8-5) and included a fourth-place finisher in the NCAA College Division. Then Bison wrestling fortunes dipped for awhile,

bounding back last year to finish fourth in the tough North Central Conference and tenth in the nation. For Maughan, who, at 5'11" and 130 pounds, is a walking advertisement for collegiate wrestling, it was just the beginning. Today's national tournament marks the culmination of seven years of hard work, dedication and commitment to a sport that Maughan contends "takes more dedication than all the others, one where it's strictly man-to-man and the wins are bigger and the losses tougher."

With the addition of Dr. Carl Miller to the staff two years ago as chairman of physical education, NDSU's commitment to a total effort in athletics and physical education became complete. Currently, under Dr. Miller's direction, the service program involves some 1,200 students. Ambitious programs are also under way for physical education majors (271 currently enrolled) intramural leagues and faculty members.

What does it all add up to?

In the words of NDSU's President, Dr. L. D. Loftsgard, it constitutes "a commitment to a singular excellence for NDSU . . . not only in athletics and physical education, but in all of the things we do."

Two years ago, Dr. Loftsgard announced his own program for achieving that level of excellence he has set for the institution. It is contained in a program titled "SU'75." As one facet of SU'75 to date, more than a million dollars has been pledged and contributed toward a \$4 million fund drive being conducted among alumni, faculty, students and friends of the university.

Pride? Yes, we are proud of our new Field House, our nationally ranked athletic teams, and our ongoing total program in athletics and physical education. And most of all, we're proud of the coaches, athletes, alumni, legislators, students, sports fans, faculty members who made it all happen.

To the visitors who are on our campus this week, we extend a most sincere welcome, and an invitation to take full advantage of the hospitality available here and in the city of Fargo. We hope we won't sound cocky, or boastful or arrogant, or anything like that. But a bit of honest pride? Surely you will understand.

# The Athletic Voice of the Colleges and Universities

The National Collegiate Athletic Association—the NCAA—evolved out of crisis 66 years ago and it has matured into the most viable force in intercollegiate athletics.

In 1905, President Theodore Roosevelt was considering a ban on intercollegiate football because of the viciousness of play in that era. Faced with the possible extinction of the game, football representatives from 13 institutions met in early December of that year to bring about reforms in college football. At a subsequent meeting later that month the NCAA was conceived.

Today the NCAA is a name recognized by Webster's Dictionary and, more important, recognized by every sports-minded individual in the country. The reason for its prominence lies in the scope of the sports activities of its members, which number over 700.

While the existence of the NCAA is well recognized, its functions might be more obscure. Probably most well-known are the 26 national championships in 17 different sports the NCAA conducts each year. In addition, the NCAA enforces a detailed code of regulations, is a means of professional communication for administrators and coaches, and a source of films, records and statistics.

In essence, the NCAA is the athletic voice of the nation's colleges and universities. When the membership voted itself legislative and executive powers shortly after World War II, the NCAA moved from a discussion group to an important and vital force in the conduct and administration of intercollegiate athletics. In the shift, the NCAA progressed from pondering primarily over playing rules to considering and acting upon any athletic problem which has spread across regional lines and became national in character.

The NCAA enforcement program has been another source of publicity, and its administration emphasizes the make-up of the NCAA. In enforcement, the NCAA acts, not as a separate entity, but in cooperation with its member institutions and allied conferences which have assured compliance with the legislation they themselves adopt.

Similarly in other areas, the NCAA is simply the colleges and universities, themselves, speaking of and acting on athletic matters at the national level.

In detail, the NCAA

... conducts 126 national championships in 17 sports. Two championships (College and University Division) are held in baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, swimming, tennis, track and field and wrestling. One meet is sponsored in fencing, ice hockey, indoor track, skiing, water polo, soccer, volleyball and lacrosse. The National Collegiate Championship series dates back to 1883 and over this 88-year span, more than 60,000 student-athletes have competed in these events with over 5,000 earning the coveted title "National Collegiate Champion."

... maintains 13 rules committees to formulate, copyright and publish rules of play for the government of collegiate sports. Members of these committees are elected by representatives of member institutions at the NCAA's annual convention in January.

... publishes annually "Official Guides" for nine sports through the College Athletics Publishing Service in Phoenix, Arizona.

... collects, compiles and distributes to the press and college officials the official statistics of college football, basketball and baseball. National Collegiate Sports Services of New York City performs these and other functions commonly associated with a record-keeping agency.

... maintains its national headquarters in Kansas City, Missouri, under the supervision of Executive Director Walter Byers.

... conducts studies as a means of developing solutions to athletic problems. Recent surveys have been made on television, post-season events, length and time of playing and practice seasons, participation and budgets for intercollegiate baseball, activities and facilities of member institutions, etc.

... participates in the U.S. Olympic, Pan American Games and International University Sports Federation movements as the administrative agency for the colleges in fund raising, sports organization and the providing of coaches and athletes for the United States' teams.

... annually awards 80 Postgraduate Scholarships of \$1,000 each to outstanding senior student-athletes who have excelled in sports, in the classroom and on the campus.

... enacts legislation to deal with athletic problems when they spread across regional lines and member institutions concur that national action is needed.

... administers group insurance programs whereby member colleges can provide catastrophe medical coverage for student-athletes injured in practice, play or transport. More than 85,000 persons are enrolled annually in the athletic medical and travel accident programs.

... maintains a central clearing and counseling agency in the field of college athletic administration.

... provides financial and other assistance to various groups interested in the promotion and encouragement of intercollegiate and intramural athletics; actively assists the various national coaches, associations in projects which provide better teaching, better competition and sounder administration.

... maintains a large film library, covering play in national meets and tournaments. This library of more than 300 titles includes films on baseball, basketball, boxing, gymnastics, ice hockey, swimming, track and field, and wrestling.

Joining Larry will be Bill Garland, a name known in wrestling for the last decade as head coach at Moorhead State College. Bill has coached numerous national place winners including, Bob Billberg, a heavyweight, who competed against Larry Kristoff.

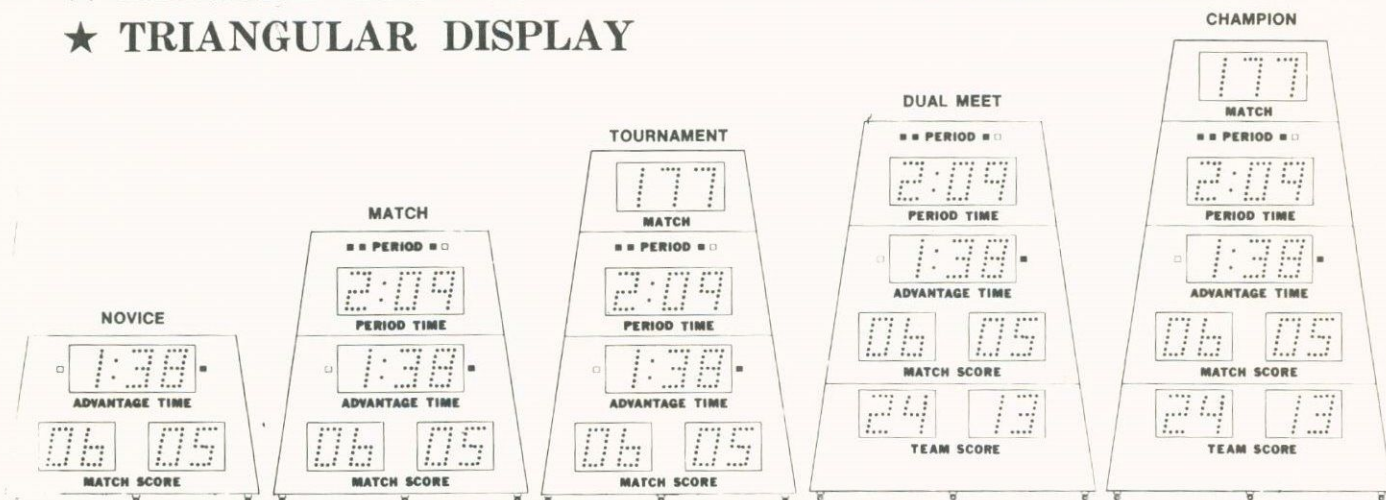
## BILL GARLAND

He has coached numerous NAIA Champions and several NCAA University Division high-placers. Bill will concentrate on takedowns and setups that he used in building the wrestling program at Moorhead State College.

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# A North Central Wrestling Recap

For the second consecutive season the North Central Conference has placed four teams among the top ten in the NCAA college-division rankings. This year's Amateur Wrestling News mid-season ratings include North Dakota State, University of Northern Iowa, Mankato State and South Dakota State among the nations elite. These same schools gained similar recognition last season.

North Dakota State University is a newcomer to the NCC national powerhouses and has yet to place in the NCAA top ten, an accomplishment that has been standard procedure for the other three schools in seasons past. The NDSU Bison pulled a few surprises two years ago in the conference tourney and placed second, a point behind champion UNI. The Bison placed fourth last year when all the top teams were rated in a toss-up situation for determining the crown. This year's team up-ended University of Nebraska-Omaha in the Omaha Invitational, winning four individual championships. NDSU beat Mankato State 19-14 and South Dakota State 22-14 in 1971 dual meet action. UNI dumped the third-ranked Bison by a 21-11 verdict to put the only blot on their dual season record.

Two former All-Americans will lead the Bison grapplers this weekend. Senior captain Sam Kucenic finished third at 126 pounds two years ago at Cal-Poly. Junior Bill Demaray placed sixth at 158 last season at Ashland and is undefeated at 177 in dual meets this season. Ken Tinquist, Lynn Forde, Gerry Seifert, Brad Williams and Bob Backlund have all fared well in NCC mat battles and should challenge for honors in their weight classes.

Coach Chuck Patten's Panthers of UNI surprised a few mat foes this season by turning a rebuilding year into one of the best small-college dual performances in the nation. The Panthers finished the NCC schedule undefeated and several UNI wrestlers will be definite threats to place in their weight classes. Lightweights Dave Nicol and Jon Moeller improved vastly from the 1969-70 season and posted excellent records. Nicol pinned NCAA university-division national champ Greg Johnson to highlight his arrival as a mighty mite. UNI lost 134-pounder Mark Sothman due to an eye injury. Sothman was in the midst of a very productive campaign to bid for an NCAA title. Clint Young also suffered an injury lay-off. Young turned in a fourth place effort last year at Ashland and should spearhead UNI's drive for team points in the middle weights. Panther heavyweight Mike McCready, with a third at Ashland, joins Young giving UNI two past All-Americans. Amateur Wrestling News designation

of UNI as the number four team among small colleges should be justified with the Panthers prowl for the NCAA spoils this weekend. Another plus for UNI will be All-American Bob Boeck who recently recovered from an injury and will be in competition for this tournament. Boeck placed third at Ashland a year ago.

Mankato State's Indians, ranked right behind NDSU and UNI, have had some tough luck in dual meets. They lost all three team confrontations against the other conference powers, but the Indians have the individual brilliance needed in a national tournament. Gary Franke, Scott Evans and Ken Stockdale should all be threats to gain team points for Coach Rummy Macias. Mike Medchill at 150 and heavyweight Dennis Pierro also rate as outstanding grapplers proven in tournaments and dual meets. This solid core of representatives could lead a Mankato bid for the national title. Mankato is the only NCC school member to have won the NCAA college-division wrestling championship and has been a challenger in all recent NCAA tourneys.

South Dakota State's Jackrabbits are led this season by the Engles brothers, Keith at 142 pounds and freshman Mike in the 158-pound division. Lightweight Stan Opp and 190-pounder Luther Onken both have the experience and potential to rack up some team points. Team balance is good on the Jack's squad and Coach Warren Williamson may well have one or more of his less-heralded wrestlers receiving an NCAA place medal. SDSU has the reputation for the longest continuous strength of the NCC teams. Williamson seldom fails to field a strong tournament unit and this year is no exception.

Other NCC teams have found the going a bit stiff against the Big Four. But these teams (North Dakota, Morningside, South Dakota and Augustana) all have young teams that include one or more top wrestlers capable of breaking the NCAA scoring ice. UND's Scott Mandy has shown enough dual-meet ability to rate as a possible point threat. USD has three top-flight middle weights in Gus Beynon, Randy Albracht and John Cuckie. Heavyweight Steve Pelot is also tough and USD may not be too far from joining the other established powers in the NCC.

The NCC has done well in competition outside the conference this year. In addition to the Bison victory in the prestigious Omaha event both SDSU and Mankato drew with the University of Washington, rated the number three team in the university-division class. UNI beat powerful Northern Illinois and looked respectable in a dual with Michigan State, number five in the NCAA University teams.

# The Scoring System

Championship bouts are eight minutes long, divided into three periods—first period 2 minutes, second and third periods 3 minutes. In tournaments, overtime consists of three 1-minute periods.

Consolation bouts consist of three 2-minute periods.

The first period of each bout will start from a standing position. Second and third periods begin on the mat in the referee's position, contestants alternating in the positions of advantages each period.

A **FALL** is decided when either wrestler has held his opponent's shoulders to the mat for one second. This terminates the match.

A **DECISION** is awarded to the contestant who scores the greater number of points in a bout where no fall occurs. If there is a tie the contestants shall wrestle three extra periods of one minute each (consolation matches included), starting the first of these periods on the feet and conducting the entire overtime as in the regular match. In the event of a tie after completion of the overtime periods, a jury of two judges and the referee shall select the winner by ballot.

## MATCH SCORING POINT SYSTEM

**TAKEDOWNS**—Taking opponent to mat with advantage ..... 2 points

**ESCAPE**—Defensive wrestler attaining a neutral position ..... 1 point

**PREDICAMENT**—A predicament is a situation in which the offensive wrestler has control of his opponent in a pinning combination and a fall or near fall is imminent ..... 2 points

**NEAR FALL**—A near fall is a position in which the offensive wrestler has his opponent in a pinning situation with both shoulders or the scapula area held in contact with the mat for less than one second or when one shoulder of the defensive wrestler is touching the mat and the other shoulder is held within one inch or less of the mat for two full seconds ..... 3 points

**TIME ADVANTAGE**—The offensive wrestler who has control in an advantage position over his opponent is gaining time-advantage. A timekeeper assigned to each wrestler records his accumulated time-advantage throughout the match or a multiple timer may be permitted to record the time-advantage. At the end of the match the referee subtracts the lesser time-advantages from the greater. If the contestant with the greater time-advantage has less than one minute of net time-advantage, no point is awarded. If he has one full minute or more of net time-advantage he is awarded one point by the referee. If he has two full minutes or more of net time-advantage he is awarded two points by the referee. No contestant can be awarded more than two points for time-advantage in any one match. The contestant with the lesser time-advantage receives no points even though he accumulates several minutes of time in the advantage position.

**FORFEIT**—A forfeit is received by a wrestler when his opponent for any reason fails to appear for the match. In order to receive a forfeit, a wrestler must be dressed and appear on the mat.

**DEFAULT**—A default is awarded in a match when one of the wrestlers is unable to continue wrestling due to an injury.

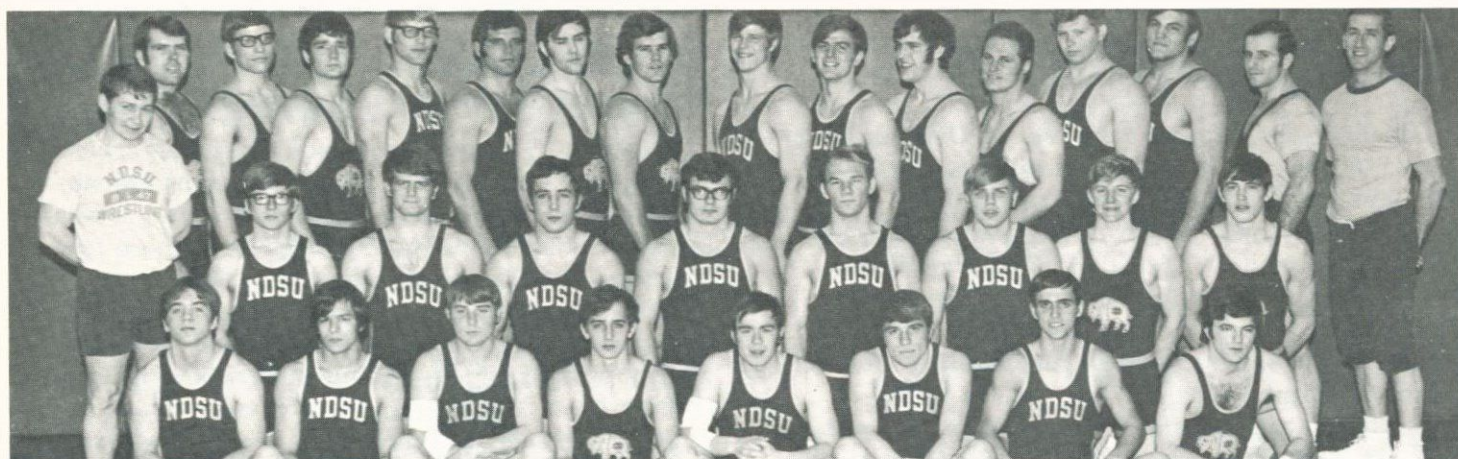
**DISQUALIFICATION**—Disqualification is a situation in which a contestant is banned from further participation in accordance with prescribed penalties.

In the National Collegiate championships six places are awarded. The defeated wrestlers in the consolation semi-finals shall wrestle off for the fifth and sixth places.

The loser in the final match automatically wins second place.

Wrestlers must wrestle at all times. Penalties are awarded by the referee under the point system for stalling, illegal holds and technical violations.

Any hold for punishment alone is prohibited.
