# 2014 HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES



## 2014 NCAA Division II Wrestling Championships

Five wrestlers and one coach are the 2014 inductees into the Division II Wrestling Hall of Fame, chosen by the NCAA II Wrestling Coaches Association.

The Division II Wrestling Hall of Fame ceremony is held in conjunction with a reception for coaches and dignitaries on Thursday, March 13, preceding the start of the 52nd annual NCAA Division II Wrestling Championships.

The 18th class of inductees are Carlton Haselrig, wrestler, University of Pittsburgh, Johnstown (1985-89); Don Henry, coach, Gannon University (1984-present); Corey Kline, wrestler, Ashland University (1995-99); Wade Schalles, wrestler, Clarion University (1971-74); Jody Strittmatter, wrestler, University of Pittsburgh, Johnstown (1997-2001); and John Strittmatter, wrestler, University of Pittsburgh, Johnstown (1995-99).

The NCAA Division II Wrestling Championships were first held in 1963. For the first 11 years it was called the NCAA College Division Tournament. In 1974, when the NCAA divided into three divisions, approximately half of the College Division schools continued competing in Division II while the other half moved into Division III.

These six inductees join the 102 inductees from the first 17 induction classes as Division II Wrestling Hall of Famers.

### Carlton Haselrig

#### University of Pittsburgh, Johnstown Wrestler

Carlton Haselrig, a Johnstown, Pa., native, is the most decorated student-athlete in Pittsburgh-Johnstown history. Haselrig won six heavyweight NCAA wrestling championships — three at the Division I level and three at the Division II level. He holds five Pittsburgh-Johnstown all-time wrestling records, as well as an overall career record of 143-2-1, which equates to a .983 winning percentage. He never lost a match in the Division I tournament (15-0 record and three titles), and he never lost to or tied a Division II opponent. His six titles were unprecedented and will remain so because the NCAA only allows student-athletes to compete in one division's championship. Also, during his Pittsburgh-Johnstown tenure, Haselrig grappled his way to an unprecedented unbeaten streak of 122 consecutive matches.

In 2005, Haselrig was named to the NCAA 75th Anniversary Wrestling Team, which included other notable heavyweights such as NCAA and Olympic champion Kurt Angle, who Haselrig defeated during his college wrestling career. Haselrig also was inducted into the Pennsylvania Wrestling Coaches Association Hall of Fame, the Cambria County Hall of Fame and the Pittsburgh-Johnstown Athletics Hall of Fame.

While in high school, Haselrig could only wrestle freestyle during the summer because a high school wrestling program was not available to him. But after taking an interest in his career, several local individuals convinced the Greater Johnstown School Board to allow him to represent Johnstown High as an independent one-man team as a senior. He posted a 10-0 record and won the Pennsylvania AAA state heavyweight title.

Following his collegiate career, Haselrig was a 12th-round draft



pick by the Pittsburgh Steelers and went on to be a Pro Bowl offensive lineman without ever having played college football. He currently is employed by the Greater Johnstown School District, and also is involved with youth wrestling and football in the Greater Johnstown area.

Haselrig and his wife, Michelle, reside in Johnstown, Pa. The Haselrigs have three children: Cantara, Carlton Jr. and Carlee.

### Don Henry

#### Gannon University Coach

A senior member of the Gannon University athletic department, Henry is in his 30th season as the head wrestling coach. Henry was hired in 1984 to resurrect a Golden Knight wrestling program that had been discontinued since 1971. Henry's work ethic and love of wrestling has elevated the Gannon program from its infancy to one that is now considered one of the best in NCAA Division II.

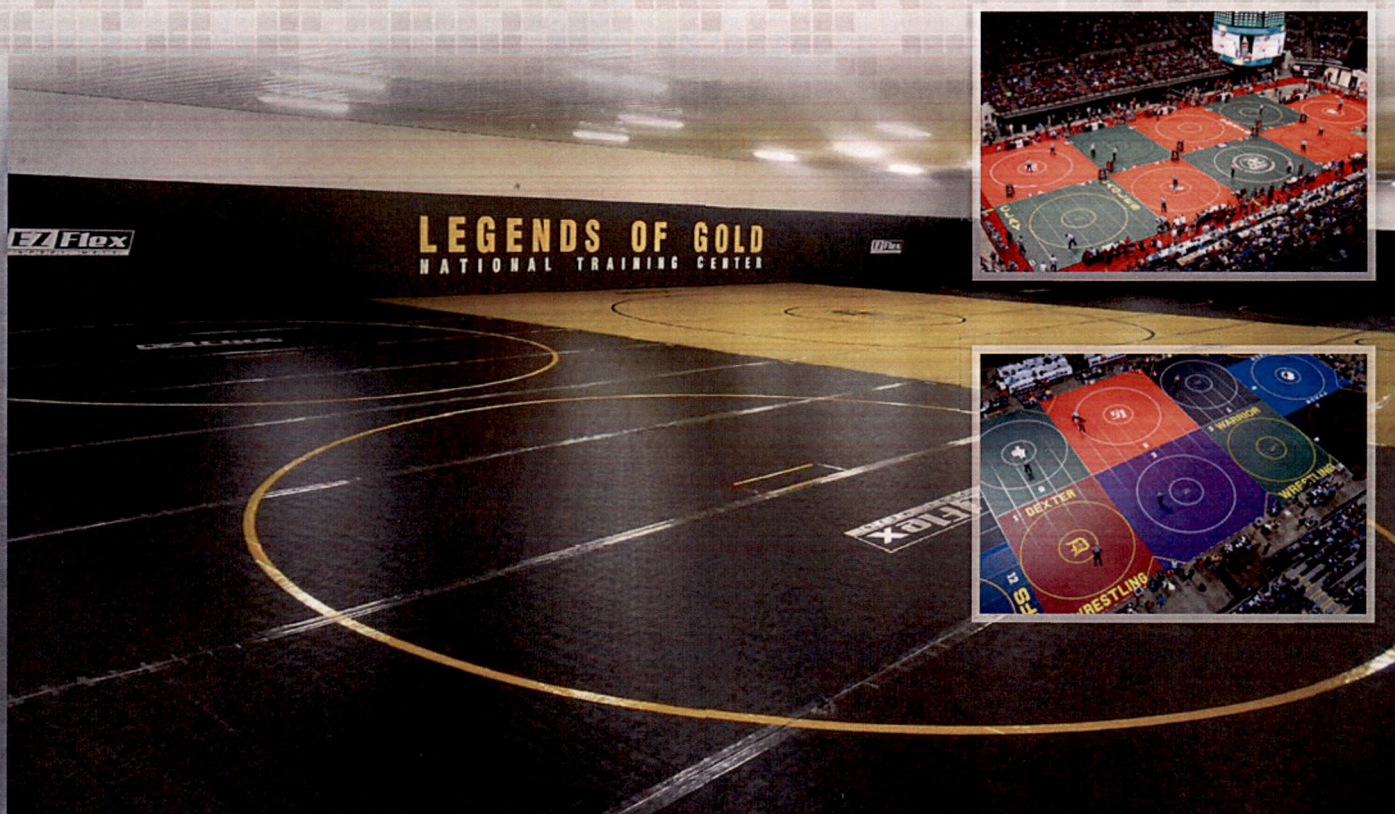
During the last 12 years, Henry has guided the Gannon program to some of the best seasons in school history. He has coached eight regional champions and has qualified wrestlers for the national championships 34 times. The Golden Knights have recorded 15 consecutive top-29 national finishes.

Gannon's 2012 regional performance resulted in Henry being named NCAA Division II Super Region One Coach of the Year for the third time in his career, including twice during a three-year span. Henry also received the National Wrestling Coaches Association (NWCA) Robert Bubb Coaching Excellence Award for the second time. The award is presented each year to the outstanding coach in each division who epitomizes the qualities and characteristics of a role model and mentor for developing young student-

athletes. Henry was nominated by his coaching peers and selected by the NWCA Board of Directors.

In 2010, Gannon sent a school-record six wrestlers to nationals, with five earning All-America honors, a school record. Gannon placed second at regionals, the highest finish in school history. Henry was honored as East Region Coach of the Year for the second time. Eight wrestlers were regional place winners, another Gannon record.

The 2002-03 season was a special one for Henry, as he received the NWCA Robert Bubb Coaching Excellence Award for the first time.

Henry coached Gannon's first national champion at the 2001 championships. Doug Joseph made school history by winning the national title at 197 pounds. Lantz Schwabenbauer placed third at 165 and Todd Proper finished third at heavyweight. Henry was named NCAA Division II East Region Coach of the Year for the first time that season.

The 30-year veteran also has his team performing in the classroom. Gannon's team grade-point average ranked third nationally in 2000-01, fifth in 2011-12, fifth in 2008-09, seventh in 2005-06, seventh in 1999-2000, eighth in 2001-02, 10th in 2006-07, 10th in 2012-13 and 13th in 2007-08.

While building the program from the ground up, Henry slowly turned the Golden Knights from a program that concentrated on the development of each individual wrestler to being a fully competitive program in dual competitions and postseason championships.

Henry has produced 31 All-Americans and 22 regional champions, along with 65 All-Academic wrestlers and 64 national qualifiers. The Gannon program has developed 22 All-Americans during the last 12 seasons.

### Corey Kline Ashland University Wrestler



Corey Kline had a successful wrestling career before attending Ashland. He was a three-time AAU/USA freestyle state champion from 1987-89. He was also a high school state runner-up for Mapleton High School (Ohio) in 1993 and a champion in 1994 and 1995.

His accolades continued to grow after stepping on the mat for the Ashland Eagles beginning in the fall of 1995. Kline was 36-6 his freshman year, winning the Division II title at 134 pounds in 1996. He was the only non-Division I wrestler named to the *Amateur Wrestling News* 1996 All-Freshmen Team. He also was the 1996 Division II National Duals MVP and the Ashland University team MVP. In 1997 Kline finished 6th at the Division II tournament at 134 pounds. He then moved up to 149 pounds and finished seventh and third at the 1998 and 1999 tournaments.

Kline finished his career at Ashland as a four-time All-American, a four-time team MVP, a two-time team captain and a national champion. He holds the Ashland team records for wins, both for a season and career. His career record for Ashland was 127-20. He was inducted into Ashland University's Athletics Hall of Fame in 2010 and is a member of Ashland's Dream Team.

Kline graduated from Ashland in 2000 with a bachelor's in education and in 2006 with a masters of education administration. He works for Black River Local Schools as a seventh grade math teacher and wrestling coach. He began coaching in 2003 and has compiled a record of 101-31. He and his wife, Heather, live in New London, Ohio, with their children, Camden, Grady and Julia.

### Wade Schalles Clarion University Wrestler



Schalles enrolled at Clarion in the fall of 1970. He was recruited by Clarion's Hall of Fame coach Bob Bubb following his senior year in high school. As a high school senior Schalles went 21-0 with 20 pins, winning the 154 pound Pennsylvania State Championships for Hollidaysburg High School.

Schalles' career at Clarion was spectacular, to say the least. At that time, freshmen were ineligible to compete in NCAA championships. Nevertheless, his accomplishments at Clarion and after graduation make him possibly the greatest wrestler to ever participate in the NCAA College Division, which eventually evolved into NCAA Division II. During his collegiate career, he compiled a 153-5-1 record, including 106 pins, which was an NCAA record for most pins in a career. He won four NCAA titles, the 1972 and 1973 NCAA College Division, and the 1972 and 1973 NCAA University Division. He was the outstanding wrestler of both nationals in 1972.

Schalles was a four-time Pennsylvania Conference Champion, and the only wrestler to win the conference outstanding wrestler award all four years. Unable to wrestle in the NCAAs his senior year due to NCAA transfer rules, Schalles pinned three of that year's NCAA University Division champions, including that year's NCAA University Division's Outstanding Wrestler. In 1973, Schalles helped lead his Clarion team to a second-place finish in the NCAA College Division tournament along with two of his teammates. Schalles, Don Rohn (134 pounds) and Bill Simpson at (167) all won championships the next week at the NCAA University Division Championships, leading Clarion to a fourth-place finish.

Schalles earned a place in the "Guinness Book of World Records" as wrestling's all-time leader in wins, with 821, and falls, with 530. He defeated 36 national champions during his career, pinning 17 of them, and he defeated eight world titlists. Each is considered a record.

*Sports Illustrated* dubbed him "the most exciting wrestler to ever walk onto a wrestling mat." Dan Gable called him "the greatest pinner I've ever seen." His nicknames included "Wonderous Wade," "Plastic Man," and the "Father of Funk." Schalles created and popularized several pinning combinations, with names like the "Spladle," the "Cement Mixer," the "Clemson Roll" and the "Lazy Man's Cradle."

In 1991, Schalles was the first from Pennsylvania to be inducted into the National Wrestling Hall of Fame. In 2006, he was one of 15 collegiate wrestlers to be selected to the NCAA's 75th Anniversary

Team. For Schalles's pinning prowess, *WIN Magazine* and the National Wrestling Coaches Association annually present the Schalles Award to the top scholastic and collegiate pinners in America.

Schalles is also an award-winning writer, a nationally known motivational speaker, a highly rated wrestling official and has had great success in coaching. From 2003-08, he was a volunteer assistant coach at Oviedo High School in Orlando, Fla. During that five-year period Oviedo won four state high school wrestling championships, and they placed third the other year.

Schalles and his wife, Debra, reside in Orlando, Fla. They are the parents of Jacob, Kristy, Ryan, Tara, Chris and Adam.

### Jody Strittmatter University of Pittsburgh, Johnstown Wrestler



Jody Strittmatter was one of Pennsylvania's most highly coveted wrestlers coming out of Cambria Heights High School in 1996. When Mountain Cat wrestling coach Pat Pecora out-recruited some of the most powerful NCAA Division I schools in the country and signed to become a Mountain Cat, the final piece of the 1999 national championship wrestling team puzzle was in place.

After redshirting as a true freshman in 1996-97, Strittmatter burst onto the Division II wrestling scene and compiled a 44-2 overall record and an 18-1 dual meet record on his way to winning an East region title and a national championship at 118 pounds in his first year of collegiate wrestling. His 24 pins broke Carlton Haselrig's previous school record of 19 set in 1986-87, while his 37 regular-season and 44 total victories both set records in his weight class that still stand today.

In most cases, that would be a season tough to top. However, 1998-99 would be even better. Strittmatter, who moved to 125 pounds, posted an impressive 43-1 overall record and a perfect 23-0 dual meet record. He won championships at the West Virginia University Open in November and the prestigious and Division I-dominated Midlands Open at Northwestern University in December. Just over two months later, he won another regional title and was named the national tournament's outstanding wrestler after winning his second-straight national championship. In the process, Pittsburgh-Johnstown claimed its second NCAA Division II championship in three years by holding off Omaha in its home gym.

In two seasons at Pittsburgh-Johnstown, Strittmatter had an 87-3 record. His .967 winning percentage is second behind only Carlton Haselrig.

Strittmatter also proved he was a true student-athlete by earning

First-Team National Wrestling Coaches Association (NWCA) All-Academic Team honors in both 1998 and 1999 as a biology/pre-medicine major.

Following the 1999 season, Strittmatter took his talents to Division I national power University of Iowa and became a two-time Big Ten champion and a two-time NCAA Division I All-American with a third-place finish in 2000 and a national runner-up finish in 2001. He also earned his second team national championship when the Hawkeyes won the NCAA Division I title in 2000.

Jody was inducted into the Cambria County Sports Hall of Fame in 2006, the District 6 Hall of Fame in 2007, the Pennsylvania Wrestling Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2010 and the Pittsburgh-Johnstown Athletics Hall of Fame in 2011.

Jody and his wife, Stephanie, reside in Ebensburg, Pa., with their newborn daughter, Journey. He, along with former Iowa teammate Eric Juergens, co-founded Young Guns Wrestling Club in 2002. Strittmatter currently runs Young Guns practices in Pennsylvania with the help of his brothers, John and Joey. Young Guns has grown to become one of Pennsylvania's premier wrestling clubs and has gained national recognition.

### John Strittmatter

University of Pittsburgh, Johnstown  
Wrestler



Most people dream of being a part of a national championship team. For John Strittmatter, he was a major part of two NCAA Division II Wrestling Championship teams. Strittmatter was a national runner-up on the Mountain Cats' 1996 title team before winning an individual national championship for Pittsburgh-Johnstown at 133 pounds in 1999 when the Mountain Cats took home their second crown in three years.

After starting as a true freshman at Penn State, Strittmatter transferred to Pittsburgh-Johnstown prior to the 1995-96 season and

immediately joined head coach Pat Pecora's starting line-up. He won an East regional championship and was the national runner-up at 118 pounds on his way to helping Pittsburgh-Johnstown claim its first team championship by holding off top-ranked University of Central Oklahoma at Northern Colorado University.

Three seasons later, Strittmatter, now wrestling at 133 pounds, reached the top of the mountain a second time. This time, Strittmatter claimed his third East regional title and won an individual championship with a decision victory over South Dakota State's Scott Braun in the finals. In the process, the Mountain Cats took home another team title over the University of Nebraska-Omaha in the Mavericks' home arena.

Strittmatter, a three-time All-American with second, fifth and first-place finishes, also was a three-time National Wrestling Coaches Association (NWCA) All-Academic Team selection. Following the 1998-99 season, John Strittmatter and his brother, Jody, also a Pittsburgh-Johnstown Hall of Famer, shared the prestigious Lowell Shaffer Award for being the school's top student-athlete.

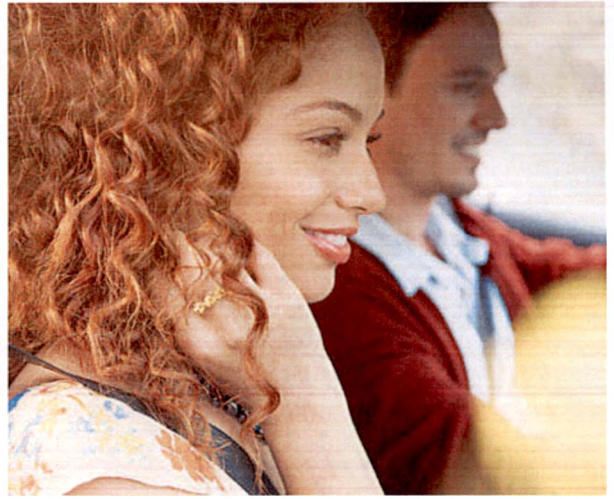
On the mat, Strittmatter was a part of four-straight NCAA regional championships and four consecutive top-five national team finishes. His 112-15 (.882) career record ranks 13th on the Mountain Cat all-time wins list. Strittmatter, a graduate of Cambria Heights High School, still holds Pittsburgh-Johnstown's record for wins in a regular season, with 35, and wins in a season, with 41 at 133 pounds. In 1999, he became the seventh Mountain Cat to reach the career 100-win plateau. Strittmatter was inducted into the Pittsburgh-Johnstown Athletics Hall of Fame in 2012.

Strittmatter earned his bachelor's degree in elementary education. He is currently a teacher in the Central Cambria School District at Jackson Elementary School in his hometown of Ebensburg, Pa. He resides with his wife, Stephanie, and their newborn son, Jackson. He also assists his brothers, Jody and Joey, with Young Guns Wrestling Club, which has developed into one of the premier and largest wrestling clubs in Pennsylvania.

# Why Play College Sports?

The advantages of competing in college sports are both immediate and lifelong

**College education.** A college degree has a direct impact on a person's quality of life. A 2013 study by The College Board shows that the median lifetime earnings of bachelor's degree recipients are 65 percent higher than those of high school graduates.

**Academic success.** Overall, college student-athletes graduate at rates higher than their peers in the broader student body. And as part of the NCAA's Academic Progress Rate data collection, we know that more than 11,500 student-athletes have returned to campuses – after finishing their athletics eligibility – to complete their degrees since 2005.

**Scholarships.** More than 150,000 student-athletes receive \$2.4 billion in athletics scholarships each year from NCAA member colleges and universities.

**Student Assistance Fund.** Division I student-athletes have access through their campus and conference offices to more than \$70 million from the NCAA's Student Assistance Fund. These funds can be used in a variety of ways, from helping student-athletes fly home in the event of a family tragedy, to purchasing a winter coat or other needed clothing that they might not be able to afford.

**Elite training opportunities.** Student-athletes have regular access to top-notch coaching, facilities and equipment. These resources typically cost Olympic athletes thousands of dollars per year.

**Academic and support services.** Student-athletes receive academic support, such as state-of-the-art technology and tutoring, and have access to athlete-focused academic advisors in addition to traditional academic advisors.

**Healthy living.** Student-athletes have access to cafeteria "training tables" on campus. In addition, some schools hire nutritionists and dieticians to work with student-athletes.

**Medical care.** The NCAA and its members set safety guidelines, playing and practice rules and standards to minimize risks and provide student-athletes with the opportunity to perform their best on the field and off. Student-athletes also have access to some of the top physicians and trainers in the world.

**Medical insurance.** Most student-athletes are provided medical insurance through their schools, and the NCAA requires that student-athletes have coverage. The NCAA also provides a catastrophic injury program on top of those plans.

**Exposure and experiences.** Student-athletes have the opportunity to travel across the country and around the world for regular-season contests, NCAA championships and foreign tours. These experiences can open doors for the less than two percent who will compete professionally – but also for the majority who will go pro in something other than sports.

**Preparation for life.** Increasingly, the business world is focusing on creating a team environment with employees. By competing in college sports, student-athletes learn important skills such as leadership, time management and how to work effectively with others toward a common goal.

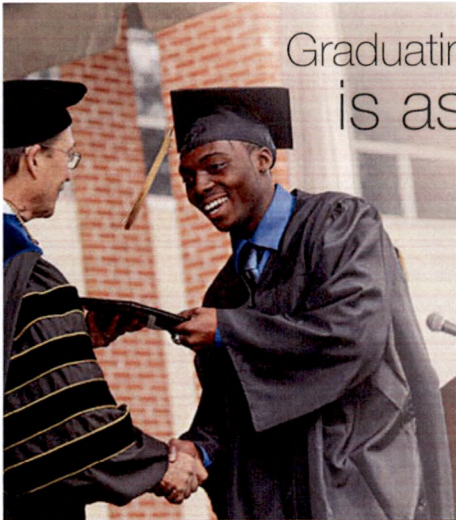

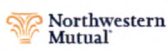
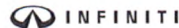
