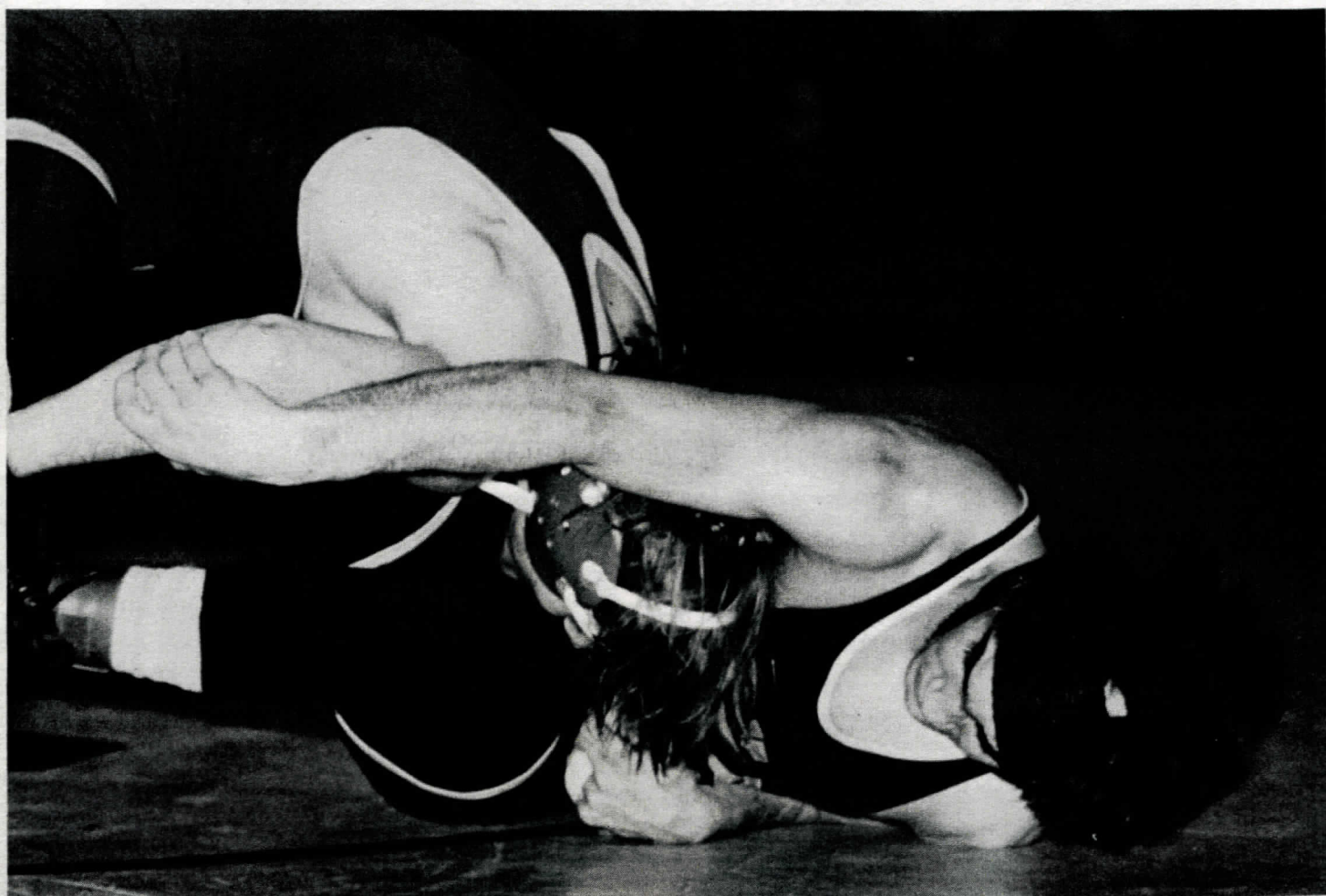

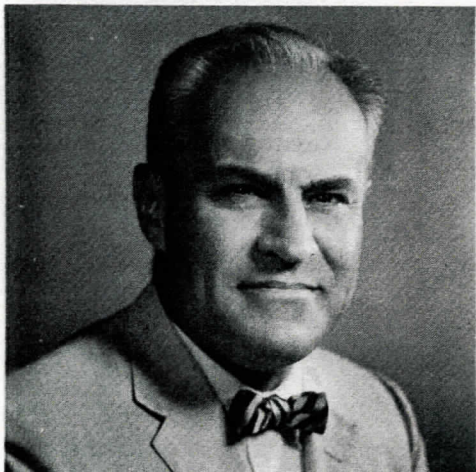

# Wilkes College at a Glance

**HISTORY** — Founded in 1933 as Bucknell University Junior College. Chartered in 1947 as an independent liberal arts college for men and women.

**ENROLLMENT** — Undergraduate, approximately 2200; Part-time, 471; Graduate, 301; Summer, 1,192.

**FACULTY** — Full-time, 165; Doctoral Degrees, 73.

**DEGREE PROGRAMS**—Baccalaureate degrees in all academic areas of the Humanities, the Social Sciences, and the Natural Sciences.

**Undergraduate:** A wide range of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science degree programs with Education certification programs available in all major disciplines.

Majors in Accounting, Biology, Business Administration, Business Education, Chemistry, Economics, Elementary and Secondary Education, Electrical Engineering, Materials Engineering, English, Environmental Science, Theater Arts, Fine Arts, Foreign Language, History, Mathematics, Medical Technology, Music, Nursing, Philosophy-Religion, Physics, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology and Social Science-Urban Affairs.

**SPECIAL COMMUNITY PROGRAMS** — Upward Bound Program; Program for Exceptional High School Students; Program for Parents of Mental Retardates; Concert and Lecture Series; Center for the Performing Arts; Summer Theater Workshop; Institute of Regional Affairs; Labor-Management-Citizens Committee; Educational Development Center; Teacher Training and Environmental Quality; Student Clean Environment Committee; NSF Junior High School Science; Reading Clinic and Science Enrichment Program.

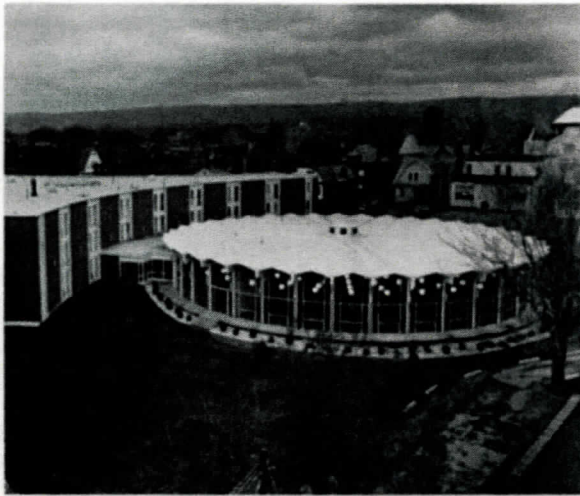

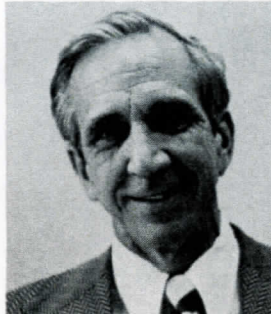

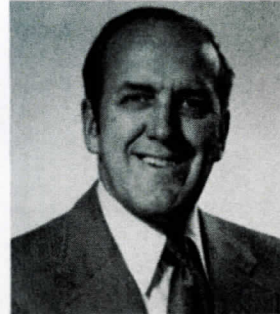

The National Collegiate Athletic Association — the NCAA — is now in its 68th year and hasn't stopped growing yet.

The NCAA stands for many different things, but it is best known for its service to its member institutions.

The NCAA has more than 750 members and has established 33 annual National Championships in 18 different sports — including four new championships in Division III. Although best-known to the public for its Championship program, the NCAA does much more than conduct this national series.

The Association serves as the governing body of intercollegiate athletics. It is truly the athletic voice of the nation's colleges and universities.

It enforces a detailed code of regulations, is a means of professional communication for administrators and coaches and is a source of films, records and statistics.

It started in 1905 when President Theodore Roosevelt was about to ban intercollegiate football because of the violence of play.

Football representatives from 13 institutions met in December of 1905 to bring about reforms in college football. Later in the month, at a second meeting, the group formed the Intercollegiate Athletic Association.

On March 31, 1906, it was officially constituted and in 1910 the ICA became the NCAA.

The NCAA moved from a discussion group to an important and vital force in the conduct and administration of intercollegiate athletics when the membership voted itself legislative and executive powers shortly after World War II.

The change quickly shifted the NCAA's main responsibility from playing rules to considering and acting upon any athletic problem which has spread across regional lines and becomes national in character.

The enforcement program of the NCAA is designed to assure compliance with the legislation, the member institutions and allied conferences have adopted.

At annual Conventions of the Association, the NCAA is the nation's colleges and universities themselves speaking and acting on athletic matters at the national level.

**More specifically, the NCAA:**

- Conducts 33 Championships in 19 sports. Three Championships (Division I, Division II and Division III) are held in cross country, outdoor track and wrestling. Two Championships (Division I and Division II & III) are held in baseball, basketball, golf, gymnastics, lacrosse, soccer, swimming and tennis. In 1973, for the first time, Division II and Division III will decide a national champion in

football through a playoff system. The National Collegiate Championship series dates back to 1883 in tennis, and during this 90-year span more than 60,000 student-athletes have competed in these events, with more than 6,000 earning the coveted title of "National Collegiate Champion."

- Maintains 13 rules committees to formulate, copyright and publish rules of play for the government of collegiate sports. Members of these committees are elected by representatives of member institutions at the annual Convention in January.

- Publishes "Official Guides" annually for nine sports through the National Collegiate Publishing Service.

- Collects, compiles and distributes to the press and college officials the official statistics of college football, basketball and baseball through its New York City record-keeping arm, the National Collegiate Sports Services.

- Maintains its national headquarters in Mission, Kansas, under the supervision of Executive Director Walter Byers.

- Conducts studies as a means of developing solutions to athletic problems. Recent surveys have been made on television, post-season events, length and time of playing and practice seasons, participation and budgets for intercollegiate baseball, activities and facilities for international competition.

- Annually awards 80 Postgraduate Scholarships of \$1,000 each to outstanding senior student-athletes who have excelled in sports, in the classroom and on the campus. A total of \$624,000 has been distributed through these scholarships.

- Enacts legislation to deal with athletic problems when they spread across regional lines and member institutions concur that national action is needed.

- Administers group insurance programs whereby member colleges can provide catastrophic medical coverage for student-athletes injured in practice, play or transport. More than 85,000 persons are enrolled annually in the athletic medical and travel accident programs.

- Maintains a central clearing and counseling agency in the field of college athletic administration.

- Maintains a large film library, covering play in national meets and tournaments. This library of more than 500 titles includes films on baseball, basketball, boxing, gymnastics, ice hockey, swimming, track and field and wrestling.

- Provides financial and other assistance to various groups interested in the promotion and encouragement of intercollegiate and intramural athletics; actively assists the various national associations in projects which provide better teaching, better competition and sounder administration.

### Preview of Things To Come

It's a whole new ball game as host Wilkes College, ranked first in the most recent Amateur Wrestling News CD III ratings, stands as the team to beat in this weekend's inaugural national mat event.

Colonels of John Reese recently copped their sixth straight Middle Atlantic Conference title and placed 5th in last year's NCAA CD tourney at Brookings, South Dakota.

This winter the Blue and Gold have wrestled 18 dual matches against perennial national powers — Lehigh, Navy, Oklahoma, Syracuse, North Dakota State, and Army. Wilkes more than held its own against this stiff competition.

Leading Wilkes are co-captains Art Trovei (142), who placed 5th in the 1973 NCAA CD confab and has a lifetime 41-6-3 dual record; and fellow senior Mike Lee (150), who finished 3rd in the 1972 national event. Lee concluded with a 38-7-2 mark.

Backing them up are experienced wrestlers John Chakmakas (134), Gene Ashley (158), Jim Weisenfluh (167), and Al Scharer (Hwt.). Additional point gatherers could be freshmen Rick Mahonski (118), Lon Balum (126), and junior Jeff McDonald (177).

If Wilkes can't capture the marbles, both Ashland and Montclair State have the firepower to go all the way.

Montclair State, located in Upper Montclair, N. J., features three tough Metropolitan Conference crownholders in Ed Alber (118), Craig Spencer (134), and Larry Hayspell (142). Indians also possess one of the finest 126-pounders in the nation in the person of Nabil Guketlov.

Joe Reid (190) and Steve Strellner (177) are also exceptional grapplers.

Ashland College of Ohio, 9th in last March's NCAA CD tournament, is paced by Ron Angello (118), Rollie Clenons (150), Clay Barnard (158), and Elijah Whitten (177).

Millersville State College is on the move, as evidenced by their 3rd place team standing in last season's tough Pennsylvania State Conference. Stan Smith (134), Joe Jacquelin (167), Rick Zinck (142), and Jim Zoschy (190) are outstanding competitors.

Brockport State, which is a member of the fast rising SUNY mat conference, could back into the title with Dave Foxen (134), John Martellucci (142), Lee Finch (158) and Paul Burns (177) capable of creating a stir.

Other challenges should come from Mt. Union, John Carroll University, Binghamton State, St. Johns University, Coe Olivet College and Cornell. These are all well balanced squads and are capable of cracking the top five.

The task of analyzing Division III schools and individuals was extremely difficult due to the lack of information available. With the passing of this weekend's initial confab the task should be easier in the future.

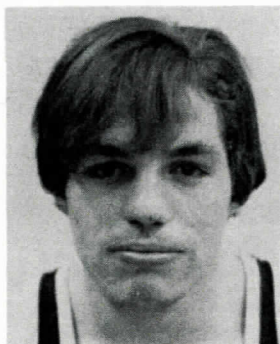

Ron Angello of Ashland is also an experienced grappler and the top seed should probably come from this group.

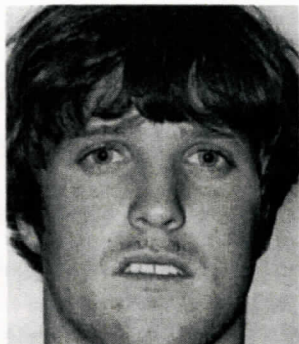

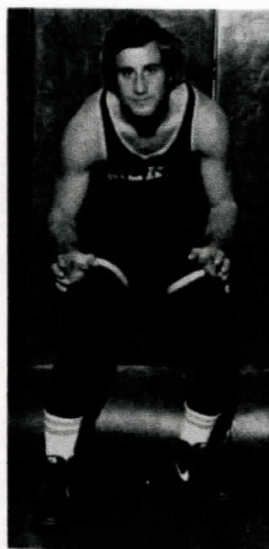
Three-time Midwest Conference champion Andy Fairle, Coe, sports an 82-8 lifetime mark and this should project him to the top of the mountain.

# Just One Big Happy Family

Whoever coined the phrase, "the family that plays together stays together," must have been an avid follower of the 1973-74 Wilkes College mat edition. In the world of athletics where the increasing emphasis seems to be centered on individualism and depersonalization, the Colonel grapplers seem to have found a happy escape.

Close friends on and off the mat, Wilkes mentor John Reese feels that this intimacy among his proteges has been a driving force in the Blue and Gold's struggle for national wrestling supremacy.

"This is probably the closest knit squad which I have ever coached at Wilkes," Reese pointed out. "These kids really stick together and help each other. Their mutual feelings towards one another has been a major reason for our success."

Two of the Colonels top middleweights — senior co-captain Mike Lee and junior Gene Ashley are both married and this has contributed much to the "family atmosphere."

Wendy (Lee) and April (Ashley) are always close to the team and mother the younger guys. This has had a tremendous effect on newcomers Rick Mahonski and Lon Balum and helped them make the big adjustment from scholastic to collegiate ranks.

The Wilkesmen have run into some tough wrestling competition this year, and the man who has kept the team loose and at ease under the myriads of pressure has been 142-pound All American, "Party Artie" Trovei.

His vibrant personality and well timed clowning has given his teammates a big lift — attitudewise. This has aided in the teams mental preparation for a match, which Coach Reese considers 50% of wrestling. On the mat, Artie is exciting to watch, but always succeeds in adding a few gray hairs to John Reese's receding hair line.

On more than one occasion during his career, co-captain Trovei's daredevil technique has backfired, causing him to lose a battle. During the past season Trovei has cut down on his miscues and has been a better wrestler for it.

Wilkes teams have always been known for their outstanding lightweight grapplers during the past decade, the Andy Matviak-John Marfia and Jay McGinley-Bob Roberts combinations only to name a few.

This year is no exception as super freshman Rick Mahonski and Lonny Balum have combined for a 27-8 log in their maiden effort.

Rick, a Williamsport (Pa.) native, encountered severe problems before the start of pre-season practice sessions when an older brother was fatally injured in an automobile accident.

As would be expected of this year's squad, the team was quick to rally to his side and saw him through the difficult months. Rick was a PIAA State champ as a junior but sustained a back injury as a senior and was forced to sit out competition.

Close observers feel that this inactivity was Mahonski's major problem early in the year. Coach Reese observed, "The layoff had

a definite effect on Ricky, not physically, as much as mentally. He hadn't wrestled for a year and had to come and prove himself all over again."

In contrast to Mahonski, Balum is a very relaxed type of performer. Lon's biggest asset has been conditioning, which on more than one occasion has helped him to beat highly touted opponents.

"He never gets flustered," Reese acknowledged, "Lon is aware that he has eight minutes to wrestle and when the third period rolls around, not many wrestlers can keep pace with him."

Two big surprises for Coach Reese this year has been juniors John Chakmakas (134) and Gene Ashley (158). Both are basically the same type of combatants, utilizing a great deal of aggressiveness which could put them in line for a national title.

Chakmakas, like Trovei emits a charisma which makes people immediately take a shine to him. John, who probably worked harder than anyone else on the team, is constantly trying to improve his technique.

To many, sophomore Jim Weisenfluh (167) might appear cocky and brazen but to those who really know him, he is more like a caged animal waiting to spring on an unsuspecting foe.

The former New York State gymnastics placewinner backs down to no one and his results have been impressive (eight pins in 16 dual bouts). "Jimmy has gotten himself in trouble against tougher foes because of his aggressiveness and untimely roll throughs," Reese reflected, "He goes for the fall immediately and you just can't do that against a strong and seasoned opponent."

After the national tournament last year, heavyweight Al Scharer defied normal mat practice and cut his sophomore 285-pound bulk to a lean and trim 225-pounds.

Early in the year, the weight loss seemed to have an effect on his grappling as he appeared a lot weaker and was being handled by a number of smaller opponents. The subsequent rough schedule and superb conditioning has seemingly paid off and the 6-5 athlete could be one of the best in the nation at present.

Molding the unit together, which many critics consider the best squad in Wilkes history is the other co-captain, Mike Lee. The Falls Church, Va. resident placed third in the NCAA CD as a sophomore but has had rough going this winter.

"Mike's problem is that he has been putting so much pressure on himself because he is a co-captain," Reese confided. "Mike feels that he has to do well and this has caused him to get a little tense and nervous for some of the big matches. He won't get much of a chance to get tense in the tournaments, with the matches coming up so quickly."

No matter what happens this weekend, each Blue and Gold competitor realizes what is expected of himself. They are more than just teammates and friends — they are part of a family, who have one goal at the moment — to be number one.

If they fail, they will fail together, and if they succeed, they will succeed as a team. They realize that one person cannot put them on top of the pack, but rather it must be a combined effort of everyone on the team.

John G. Reese is completing his 21st season at the helm of the Wilkes College Wrestling Colonels. Over the years his teams have compiled an outstanding collegiate dual record of 198-37-6 including undefeated seasons in 1958-59 (7-0); 1960-61 (11-0); and 1970-71 (13-0).

During this period the Reesemen have also won 13 Middle Atlantic Conference championships and a runner-up trophy in the 1966 NCAA "College Division" tourney.

The successful Wilkes mentor has produced four NCAA and one NAIA champions. In Middle Atlantic Conference tournaments, 44 Wilkesmen have emerged as titlists.

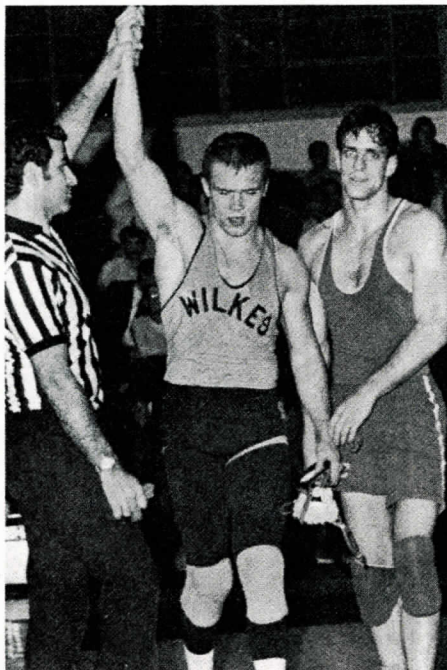
A Wyoming Valley native, Reese attended Kingston High School, where he began his grappling career. While there the Blue and Gold head mentor achieved honors on the district level and was also a PIAA State finalist.

After attending Millersville State College, he completed his undergraduate work at Penn State University where he earned a B.S. degree in Physical Education in 1951. Since coming to Wilkes in 1953, Coach Reese has succeeded in building the Colonels into national prominence.

In addition to his coaching duties, Reese is also Director of Athletics at the College. A past member of the NCAA Wrestling Rules Committee, he is also a former president of the NCAA College Division Wrestling Coaches (1968-69).

Other grappling affiliations include the United States Olympic Wrestling Committee and the governing board of the United States Wrestling Federation. Reese is also the inventor and developer of a new type of wrestling protective headgear, now being used extensively across the country.

John is married to the former Patricia Tosh of Wilkes-Barre and they are the parents of three children.

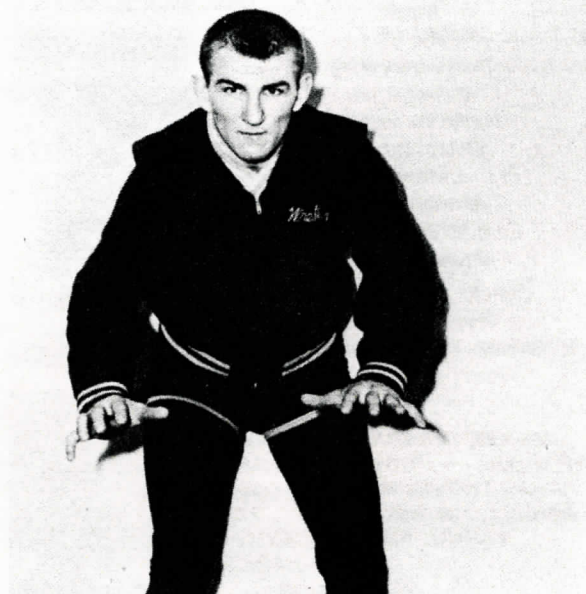

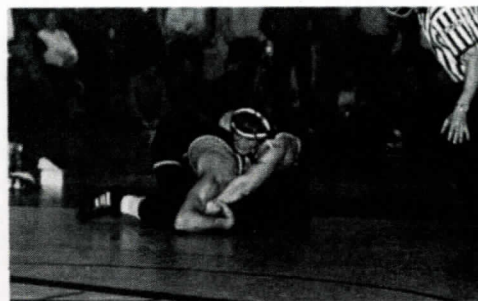

# MAT HISTORY OF THE NCAA COLLEGE DIVISION

## 1973 CHAMPIONSHIPS

Cal Poly San Luis Obispo won its sixth straight College Division wrestling championship and its seventh in the last eight years in the meet held at South Dakota State University.

Cal Poly won going away, piling up 108 points to runner-up Clarion State's 80. The winning total was the third highest in the meet's history. North Dakota State was a distant third with 59½ points.

Larry Morgan of the national champions pinned his opponent in 0:34 of the final match in the 134-pound class and was named the meet's Outstanding Wrestler.

Wade Schalles and Bill Simpson of Clarion State reigned in the 158-pound and 167-pound classes respectively and went on to win those divisions in the University Division meet.

## THE BEGINNING OF A NEW ERA

History is being made this weekend as the NCAA conducts its first Division III wrestling tournament ever.

With the idea of getting more small college teams involved in post-season mat competition, the NCAA in its winter meeting last January divided the sprawling college division into two distinct categories.

NCAA officials feel that this change will have a marked effect on attracting new schools to national tournaments which normally would not have participated because of school sizes.

Forming the backbone for future history of the spanking new CD Division III are small colleges such as Colorado Mines, Franklin & Marshall, Albany St. (N.Y.), Brockport St. (N.Y.) Ashland, Lycoming, Augustana, Cornell, New York Maritime, Oswego St., Saint Olaf, Wheaton, and Wilkes — which copped at least one individual NCAA champion in the 11-years that the College Division (1963-73) operated as one entity.

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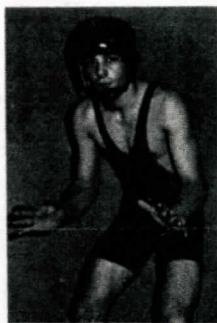
